

OUTRIGGERS ROUNDING FOR TRACK GO RECORDS EXPECTED TO BE SHATTERED

Under the coaching and training of Bill Inman the Outrigger track team for the A. A. U. track and field meet April 10 has rounded into shape during the last week. Even though there has been a great deal of rain, Alexander field has seen many athletes every evening. Last Friday and Saturday a few tryouts were held to see what the men could make and to prepare for the tryout track meet to be held by that club on the coming Saturday. Clifford Melim stepped out in the 60, better than he had been expected. Melim also ran the 100 and the 220, and made times in those respective races, that should net the Outriggers a couple of first places.

The hurdles will be another one of the Outrigger's strong points, as they have about six good men. It will be hard to pick four good men from these six. So far "Moose Jaw" Canario is leading the bunch in the full 120 yard stretch of high hurdles, but Macconel, Leal, McGuire, Lambert and Bryant are right on his heels. This same bunch is fighting it out for the four places in the low hurdles, and Leal will likely be the club's best bet in that race, although Canario and Lambert are only three inches behind him. Lambert is a new man in the running game. He had a little experience while in St. Louis college, but this is his first day at hurdling, and he is improving every day and will likely be in the best of form by the time the meet comes around, so the onlookers want to keep an eye on him.

Other Stars

In the 880 there is no doubt that "Jinky" Crozier will lead the bunch, as his record in the running game has been the best for the last two years. Close behind Crozier will be Deverill, the same man that was on his heels in the interscholastic meet. Deverill is a new man, but he has showed that he has the stuff in him, and he is equal to a good race. Another good half miler will be in this race in the person of Joe Stickney. Canario is running the mile in fine form and will likely make the best time in that race that has been made since the 25th Infantry was here. Close behind Canario in this race is Fritshi, who runs a fine race.

In the 440 they have plenty of good men, with Crozier in the lead again, but this time he has many more men who will be right at his heels. Among them are Stickney, Cleghorn, Bush, Peterson and Lambert.

In the pit events both Lindley and Harvey ought to bring down several points each. Lindley is well known to most everybody as one of the best high

jumpers and pole vaulters in the islands, and Harvey is right under him in the pole vault and can spring a few feet in the broad. Some other men in the pit are Lambert, Campbell, Macconel, Mott-Smith, Leal, McGuire and Searle. In the shot and discus the Outriggers have the two Punahou weight men, Mott-Smith and Lydgate, who will be sure to account for something. Lambert, Ruttman and Paty will also figure in this part of the meet.

The Outrigger team is bound to spring some surprises this season, as Bill Inman has developed a good many stars out of raw material.

HEALANI MERMEN ALL IN HARNESS FOR MIX

The mermen of the Healani Boat club have commenced the last leg of their training for the Centennial swimming meet on April 17 and 19.

He will also enter some of the races, probably the back-stroke events. Bob Fuller is Healani's diving expert, and expects to do as well as usual this time. He is ranked as the best diver in the islands.

Besides these, many other men will help to make up Healani's total. The boys are out practising hard every night.
