

# SURF RIDERS SLIDE OUT ON TOP IN A. A. U. TRACK AND FIELD TITLE MEET

Only one Hawaiian record was broken in the annual A. A. U. championship track and field meet held Saturday afternoon at Alexander field. By the topping score of 76 points the Outrigger Canoe club took the affair, tallying more than double the number of points of its nearest competitor, the Waikiki Athletic club, which last year swept the boards. The Waikikis finished second with a total of 34 points, while the Braves got 14½. Palama got 14, Kamehameha got 13, and the All-Around Chinese made 8½. Unattached athletes accounted for 10 points.

The shattered record was registered in the first event to be completed. It was the mile walk, although Menescke of Palama, who made it, was disqualified. The time was 18:19.3 as against the record of 18:26 made by G. W. Scott in 1917. Tom Downey of Palama won the race.

## Record Tied

One record was tied. Cliff Melim, the Outrigger Canoe club star, equalled his own record of :56.2 for the 44 yard dash made in 1917. In the century dash the time was slow. Melim made it in 10.2 and both he and Wong, who finished second, have made it in :10.1.

The Outriggers had everything their own way making points in every event on the program with the exception of the five mile race. How Coach Bill Inman came to overlook that is a wonder for his men took something everywhere else. The Trail and Mountain club made three points by taking second place in the mile walk. The Waikikis registered points in 10 events, the Braves in five events, the Palamas in four, the Kams in four, the Chinese in five and the service men in two events.

## Star Lineup

The Outrigger had a galaxy of stars including the best men from Punahou and besides that a number of others such as Cliff Melim, Joe Stickney and Gilbert Canario. Wayson Williams of Punahou competed for the Waikikis and won the pole vault at 10 feet 7 inches. He almost made 10 feet 11 inches but luck was against him.

Cliff Melim led in individual scoring with a total of 16½ points, while "Jinkey" Crozier, his clubmate, was second with 11½ points. Leal of St. Louis finished third with 8 points. Tin Luke Wong was the chief competitor against Melim but was beaten out in every race by narrow margins.

## Other Stars

The Marines came into the limelight in the mile run which Wallace Harding captured from Vivus of the Braves by seven yards. The half mile was easy money for Crozier. "Buck" Aarona had a walkover in the high hurdles annexing the event for the Waikikis. Hipo of Palama took the high jump defeating G. B. Linley, Hawaiian record holder of this event. Leal of the Outriggers won the broad jump. The Outriggers

had two teams in the relay and one finished first and the other third.

The largest crowd that ever attended a track meet was on hand for the occasion. The failure of the promised soldier guard expected to be on hand, held up the meet while the crowd was moved back from the racing lanes.
