

# OUTRIGGERS BEAT NAVY 26 TO 0 BY PILING UP SCORE IN SECOND HALF

## Moiliili Field Scene of Hot Melee Between Two Major Division Teams. Offsides Were Costly For Surfriders

After successfully holding the Outrigger Club for half the game the Navy team from Pearl Harbor Athletic Club began to weaken in the second half and finally went down to defeat before the surfers by a 26 to 0 score yesterday afternoon.

In the early stages of the game the Navy more than held its own and was strong in aggressive tactics. Later, as the players began to weary, the Outriggers had things nearly all their own way and were able to pound the sailors back into their own territory time and time again. Navy fought desperately and brilliantly despite the big score that was being piled up against them, and, toward the last of the game, put across a spurt that was a surprise to the spectators. Twice the Outrigger goal was in danger, and twice desperate defense by the surf riders returned the play to midfield in the nick of time.

Stafford Austin was the outstanding player of the day. All through one quarter he was at the apex of the play for Outrigger for big gains and was one of the main point winners in all parts of the session. Joe Stickney, who played in the latter part of the game for the Outrigger, showed remarkable speed, while Esmond Parker was another star performer.

Gates and Paddy were two of Navy's stars. Gates in the earlier part of the game was the chief yardage accumulator of the sailors and Paddy played splendid interference from start to finish, being laid out several times, and finally being taken off the field by the Ambulance squad after having been knocked out in a vicious scrimmage.

Outrigger was a consistent offender in the matter of offside, the whole left of the line seemingly being possessed of a mania for this offense. Three chances to score were lost in this manner. Navy was an offender in this regard a couple of times. The longest penalty of the day was imposed upon Outrigger for illegal tackling, this error in tactics costing them fifteen yards.

There was a good attendance and the game was cleanly played. It is worthy of note that the session opened on time and was played off in a business like manner. All plays were hard fought. There was no slacking and no let up in the battling spirit on either side. In spite of the one sided score the game was most satisfactory.

### First Quarter

The opening kick placed the ball well in Navy territory. Navy took the offensive along with the possession of the ball, and by line plunges and snappy end runs forced the play to Outrigger and caused that organization to retreat in the face of a deadly assault. Early in the game Outrigger was penalized five yards for the first offside play of the day. Gates of the Navy made his first spectacular dash and broke through the opposition line for fifteen yards. The play was centering on the fourth down when a long punt that was missed by Parker gave Navy a breathing spell on the twenty-five yard line of the opposition. The quarter ended with the ball in Outrigger territory on the thirty-five yard line.

### Second Quarter

Outrigger had the ball and failed in yardage for three downs. On the fourth down the Surfers tried a punt. Schriever, the Navy fullback, caught it and was downed in his tracks by fast work on the part of Outrigger's ends. Jimmy Hart a few minutes later recovered a fumble and dodged through the field for a fifteen-yard gain. Austin received the play on the next series and made a spectacular run for a touchdown that did not make connections, the referee deciding that an offside play had been committed. Andrews forced a gain of five yards for the Surfers and repeated his performance a few seconds later. Outrigger was forcing Navy back all the while, and when on the fifteen-yard line a forward pass was called for. It failed, and the next play was an attempted field goal on a drop from Parker that did not cross the bar. Navy took possession of the pigskin and began a steady series of gains; with Paddy as the center of the forward movement. With only one more down to go Navy tried a punt that was snuffed by Hart and carried to the middle line. A fumble forced Outrigger back five yards, but a forward pass to Bryant carried the ball through a half dozen of the Navy's fastest men for a fifty-yard run that finished across the line. The touchdown was not allowed on account of offside, and the game settled down to close the first half with a series of line plunges.

### Second Half

Outrigger's kick-off faked and went out of bounds, so the performance had to be repeated. Another offside was committed early in this quarter by Outrigger and another five yards was the result. Fuller next took a neat forward pass for a down on a flying tackle on Navy's fifteen-yard line. Austin was called on for results and gained five yards. An offside by the Navy brought the ball on the sailors' five-yard line. Austin made his third hard-won gain of about five yards, and there was but one yard more to go for a touchdown. Parker smashed through the line and crossed, but an offside was called, setting Outrigger back five yards. Austin's repeated plunges at the line carried the Navy back until the last ground was regained, and a final tremendous effort made the first real score of the day. Austin was given the kick at goal, but missed. Score, 6-0.

A missed punt endangered Outrigger's goal for a few moments, but fast recovery in the way of blocking the line and a fair punt cleared the air again. Navy got the ball and tried a few snappies and a forward pass that failed. On the fourth down the sailors had not made their yardage and lost the ball. Fuller went in for two five-yard gains for Outrigger just as the whistle sounded the quarter.

### Fourth Quarter

Outrigger had the combination on Navy in the final period and had little

trouble in forcing the play throughout. Right off the bat Outrigger was charged up with a fifteen-yard penalty for illegal tackling. Kahanamoku here went in for Thompson, Bill Hollinger for Andrews and J. Hollinger for Austin. Outrigger resumed the offensive, and after Navy had been penalized for an offside that brought the play near the Navy goal line, Parker caught the punt and ran down ahead of a sprinting field for a touchdown. The goal was kicked. Score, 12-0.

Navy caught the kick-off and ran it back for twenty yards in the face of frenzied efforts of Outrigger to down the runner. Coach Withington of the Outriggers turned all his sube loose on the lot and replaced nearly all the regulars. Navy began a series of desperate thrusts at the line and forced the play to within ten yards of the Outrigger goal posts, but lost the ball after four downs had failed to gain the required distance. Paddy was taken out after a hot scrimmage and was carted over to the ambulance. Campbell punted to the far end of the field and the play was held there. Outrigger ran down a fumble to back of the line, and Bill Hollinger broke through for a touchdown. Outrigger lost the try at goal by allowing the ball to touch the ground after the touchdown. Score, 18-0.

In the last five minutes of play Navy put up a hard struggle, but by vast speed on the part of Joe Stickney, Outrigger scored another touchdown after a startling forty-yard end run. The goal was kicked. Score, 26 to 0.
