

SURFERS OUTLAST SAILORS, TAKING GRUELING BATTLE BY SCORE OF 26 TO ZERO

Exhibiting greater stamina, the Outrigger Canoe club football team defeated the Navy 26 to 0 Sunday afternoon at Moiliili field after the sailors had shown real aggressiveness during the first half of the game. The Navy team fought brilliantly, but the men showed weariness in the second half, though toward the end they recovered to put forth a spurt that surprised spectators and opponents alike.

The Stars

Stafford Austin, former player for the old College of Hawaii team, was the chief star for the Outrigger

club. Joe Stickney was another star and so was Esmond Parker. On the Navy team Gates and Paddy led the rest. While both teams were penalized for offside, the Outriggers were at fault more often than their opponents in this respect.

There was a goodly crowd on hand for the melee, and something over \$100 was collected to pay the officials. The game was clean and hard fought, and what is of more interest, started on time.

First Half

The Outrigger kicked off and the Navy advanced the ball like a well-oiled machine. Gates made a neat dash of 15 yards. The period was featured by the Navy's strong march down the field, the first quarter ending with the ball on the Outrigger's 35-yard line. The Surfers came back strong in the second quarter, punting and downing the man who took the ball from the air. Hart dodged through a broken field for 15 yards and Austin made a neat run to a touchdown, but the referee decided that it was an offside play. A forward pass and a drop kick by the Surfers failed and then the Navy had its innings by making a strong advance. Hart grabbed a punt and Bryant carried the ball on the next play through the Navy defense for a 55-yard run that ended in another touchdown that the referee would not allow as being offside.

Second Half

The second half saw the Outrigger stronger than ever. Resorting to line plunging, Austin smashed and smashed at the Navy line until finally he got across the line for the first official touchdown. Austin kicked, but failed to convert the tally. The remainder of the quarter was spent with the Surfers trying hard for another tally.

In the final frame the Outrigger team again resumed the offensive with Kahanamoku, Bill Hollinger and John Hollinger replacing Thompson, Andrews and Austin. Parker caught a punt and scored the second touchdown which was converted. Coach Paul Withington of the Surfers turned loose his second string men and the Navy forced the ball down to within 10 yards of the Outrigger goal, but lost on downs. The Surfers punted and held the play down at the Navy end of the field, where a fumble gave them the ball with the result that Bill Hollinger plunged through for another touchdown. The goal failed at conversion.

In the dying moments of the game, the Navy team put on a great spurt, but the brilliant attack went for nothing when Joe Stickney grabbed the ball and scored another touchdown for the Outrigger after a 40-yard run. The goal was kicked.
