## Series Would Not Interfere With Interscholastic Games, Played On Saturday; Island Championship Game Suggested

Prospects appear favorable for the civilian population of the city to see the Service football teams in action against the civilian teams.

The Service league opens its series tomorrow, and two games will be played each Saturday up to and including December 4th.

The civilian league series starts Saturday, December 4, and games will be played each Saturday and Sunday following up to and including December 19.

There are five teams in the Service league, four of which will play and one rest each Saturday. Why not give the resting team a chance to show what it can do against the civilian outfits?

The Fort Kam-Luke Field team rests tomorrow. What's the matter with pitting them against the Outrigger, Palama or Waikiki team?

November 20 is a rest day for the Navy bunch. The gobs made a fine showing against the Outriggers last Sunday, and by the time they have busked through a couple of hard Service games should be able to give the Waikikis a hard rub. If they show as much improvement between the Outrigger and Waikiki games as they did between the Palama and Outrigger set-tes, the beachcombers will have to go some to beat them.

Then November 27 the Town Posts team, comprising players of Fort Ruger, Fort De Russy, Fort Shafter, Triplet Hospital and the Hawaiian Ordnance Depot, takes a day off. The Outriggers would undoubtedly enjoy an afternoon of pastiming with the Honolulu branch of the Service footballers.

Up until November 21 these games could be staged at Moiliili field on Sundays and thus avoid detracting from the attendance at the Interscholastic games being played on Saturdays during November. The Saturday Interscholastic games will be pau after November 20.

If the champion team of the Service League can be held together until December 25, it could be stacked up against the champion team of the civilian league on Christmas morning to fight for the Island championship, and the winner of that game would be the logical opponent for the University of Nevada on New Year's Day.

If Captain Forbes of the Schofield team, Lieutenant Cassidy of the Town Posts team, Lieutenant Gale of the Fort Kam-Luke Field team and Ensign Harris of the Navy team can get together with Benny Clarke of the Palamas, Esmond Parker of the Outriggers and Scotty Schuman of the Waikikis, there should be little difficulty in arranging these service-civilian games.

The game was good all the way through, with a lot of passing and open formations. The Academy team seemed a little better in team work than the Blues, and also on defense. Penalties were few and the game was clean.

For the Academy, Chi and Judd showed up very well in the backfield, gaining ground consistently and forming good interference. For the Puns, Cooke, Murray, R. and P. Robinson and Sayres played well. Much credit is due little Robinson for his tackling. He saved his team twice from what looked like a clear field.

The first half of the game was an exchange of punts and losses of the ball from one side to the other. The Puns resorted to bucking the line and ends more than anything else. They failed to score, and resorted to passes, and managed to work them a little. The Academy team mixed its play, with line plunges, end runs, passes and tackle-around plays, which netted them considerable ground. There was quite a lot of fumbling on both sides, and this accounted partly for the close score.

The second half started off with a bang on both sides, each using passes consistently. The Academy gained a great deal on end runs. The last quarter decided the game for the Kaimuki Midgets. A pass from Cruickshank to Asy netted the touchdown. In bringing out the ball to the twenty-yard line the kicker dropped it and the try for goal was lost. With only a few more minutes to play the Kaimukis held the Puns down, with the end of the game in their favor. The quarters were of ten minutes each.
