

# PUNAHOU COACHES ARE AGREED THAT STYLE OF PLAY TO BE USED NEXT SUNDAY IS THE BEST

Withington, Slade, Midkiff and Others Are For Strategy That Will Be Used By Outriggers and Waikikis

Punahou's success this year in the Interscholastic League football season has been due chiefly to the Harvard system of play, as instilled in the team work by Coach Paul Withington. At least, that is the statement made by officials of the school.

In speaking at chapel on Monday morning, Dr. Griffiths, dean of the college, told of the successes of the football team and described the problem that faced the coaches at the opening of the football training.

The problem was to work out a special line of play that would give an advantage to the Buff and Blue, in spite of superior tonnage had by opposing teams this year. Accordingly the three coaches, Slade, Midkiff and Withington, together with Dr. Griffiths, met and explained their particular plans of play. After much thought and debate, the Harvard system, as expounded by Withington, was decided upon and has been since used successfully by all of the Punahou teams, from the collegiate down to the sixth grade elementary class team.

### Sunday the Same

This same type of play will be an important feature in Sunday's game between the Outriggers and Waikikis at Moiliili field. It affects the line chiefly, inasmuch as it gives strength to that department in the face of heavier opposition. Defensive as well as offensive power is materially increased by this technique, while the system gives ample opportunity for an open mode of play if so desired, or provides for straight and effective bucking of the line.

That the system is a success goes without saying; Harvard's record for past years proves that, to say nothing of the signal success that has attended the efforts of the Punahou teams that are playing along these lines.

Just what will happen when two teams, playing in the same general manner and following certain well developed theories, meet with an even distribution of weight and speed, remains for Sunday's play to determine.

Just what wrinkles in the game are known by Coach Gilman of the Waikikis that are not known by Withington of the Outriggers, and what kinks of shifty play developed by Withington to the exclusion of Gilman will be determined at Moiliili field on Sunday when the whistle blows for the opening of the game at 3:30 o'clock.

Prognostications are plentiful. Each team has a host of supporters and boosters. These are all rabidly inclined in favor of the one or the other. What is more, the individuals of each team are all well-known residents, the majority of whom have splendid records in intercollegiate sports on the mainland, and therefore the personal element has entered with a vengeance.

An additional feature is the fact that the winners of this game stand the favorites for the rest of the season, ultimately, so it is freely predicted, to meet University of Nevada on New Year's Day, after the Sagebrushers have taken on the University of Hawaii.

The general opinion is that the Waikikis will depend mostly on forcing a way through the line, or close plays around the ends, with Galigan and Aaron as the centers of play. Outrigger is expected to rely chiefly on speed, which will make forward passes, runs and kicking the features of the contest. Of course, Outrigger is confident that with the new lineup the Waikiki line can be held, while Waikiki feels that they have as fast a team as Outrigger, but the coaches have decided on the type of play wanted for best results and the game will be put across accordingly.
