

Strenuous Time Expected At Moiliili Field Sunday When Waikiki and Outrigger Meet

Backers of Neither Team Are Over-Confident, and Hard-Fought Contest Regarded As Certain To Result

With the Waikiki-Outrigger encounter but two days away, the game is the one big topic among gridiron fans, and while each team has its pronounced partisans, it is hard to find anyone who looks for either to have an easy victory.

Backers of the Waikikis are confident, but that's all. Outrigger adherents expect their team to win, but aren't saying by how big a score. In fact, the two elevens will go to the field without either being cursed with that ancient enemy of football coaches, over-confidence. Certain it is that the game will be hard-fought—perhaps the feature contest of the season.

The game, which will start at 3 p. m. Sunday at Moiliili field, is regarded as the one which will determine which team will fight it out with the University of Hawaii for the Island championship. While it has not been definitely determined, a New Year game in Honolulu between the University of Nevada and some Island team is wanted. If the University of Hawaii wins the Island honors, then this New Year game, if played, would probably see a picked team of local stars as opponents for the Sagebrushers. However, if another team than the U. of H. should be Island champion, then that team would have the New Year game with Nevada. Either the Waikiki or the Outrigger eleven, with their strong lineups of veteran players, is regarded as a possible victor over Coach Eliot's crew.

Leal Joins Waikiki

Waikiki has recently been strengthened by the addition of George Leal, former Punahou star, to the squad, and it is thought that if he shows up as expected in practice he will be seen in the regular lineup before the season's end.

Scotty Schuman, manager of the Waikikis, said last night that his team "would win, if the breaks didn't go against it."

"We should be able to beat the Outriggers on straight football," he said. "I expect my team to gain more ground than their opponents, and unless the luck goes against us we should win."

Lineups Are Tentative

The probable lineup of the Waikikis is as follows: William Clark, center; Robinson and O'Sullivan, guards; Kanaka and H. Clarke, tackles; Gilman and Rodriguez, ends; Crabbe and Aarona, halves; Thurston, full; Rosa, quarter.

Leal and Galligan will be held in reserve as backfield men, and will probably be sent in during the game. Line substitutes include Aylett, S. K. R. Mong, Hart, Kabele, Perry, Fragas and Kahalawai.

The Outriggers have quite an injured list, with Boyd with a strained ankle, Kaupiko nursing a strained shoulder, Paty a bruised knee and Colterjohn a bad leg. Their lineup is not settled, but at present it looks as if they would enter the game something like this:

Anderson, center; Hiorth and Kaupiko, guards; Withington and Kahana-moku, tackles; Fuller and Thompson, ends; and Parker, William Hollinger, Elisha Andrews and Hart in the backfield.

There are several former mainland college stars on the two teams, besides many of the best men turned out by the local schools.

One of the biggest crowds of the season is expected at Moiliili for the game.
