

# BEACHCOMBERS COME FROM BEHIND IN TOUGH BATTLE AND NOSE OUT SURF TEAM

Playing a punting game and taking full advantage of fumbles, the Waikiki football team came from behind and won an uphill fight yesterday afternoon at Moiliili field by a score of 14 to 7 from the Outrigger Canoe club eleven before a crowd that packed both bleachers and filled half of the grandstand. The first two goals scored, one by each team, were flukes, while the winning tally came on a blocked punt.

J. Atherton Gilman, Harvard player and All-American tackle of 1915, was the star for the winners, taking part in every play and blocking the punt that resulted in the winning touchdown. Second to him on the winning team was Mac Rosa who played quarterback throughout most of the game. "Piper" Rodriguez was the man who dropped on the ball after Gilman blocked the punt in the dying moments of the fray. Kanohu scored the other Waikiki touchdown in grabbing the ball on his own 30 yard line and running the field. Parker tallied for the Outriggers when he intercepted a forward pass on his own three yard line and romped the entire distance for the surfers' lone score.

## On the Spot

Despite the fact that the Outrigger made more yards from scrimmage, their gains came at moments when it did not help them to any great extent. On the other hand, the beachcombers made their yardage count. Fumbles lost the Outriggers many yards.

Gilman showed a wealth of speed in getting down to the man with the ball. Time and time again, during the latter half of the game, he nailed the man receiving the pigskin before the latter could start and he blocked two attempts at punting in midfield besides the one he stopped back of the Outrigger goal line. The Outriggers tried innumerable forward passes that went astray.

## The Game

The first quarter went by without a score. Waikiki kicked off and then came a series of punts and attempted forward passes. The ball worked back and forth for the entire quarter through these punts, finally ending with the ball in Waikiki territory just inside the half-way line.

The second quarter saw the Wacs start an offensive. The Outriggers had the ball and almost made their yards but on the fourth down were penalized for holding and on the next play, a fumble gave the ball to the Wacs on the 30 yard line. The beachcombers ripped through for first down on four plunges and finally got the ball to the three yard line. With one down to go, Gilman signalled for a forward pass that went over his head into the arms of Esmond Parker who ran off down the field alone and scored the first touchdown for Outrigger, Withington kicking goal.

The Outrigger gained ground on scrimmage easily after this score but lost the ball when attempting a forward pass. Gilman punted out of danger but the surfers punted back shortly after and the half ended with the ball in Waikiki territory.

## Second Half

The game was evened up shortly after the opening of the third quarter. Outrigger kicked off and got the ball shortly after. The ball was snapped back for a buck through center but there was no one to receive it and Kanohu picked up the leather and raced away for the knotting tally, Gilman kicking goal.

Following the kickoff came more punts and penalties. The beachcombers had the best of the rest of the period so far as ground gaining was concerned but the teams milled about the center of the field most of the time.

## Final Frame

The Waikiki gained a little with the opening of the final quarter when Mac Rosa was hurt and Bill Rosa came in his place. Rodriguez punted and as the ball came down one of his own men touched the leather the whistle blowing. But Withington grabbed the ball and raced down to the Wac goal and sat there. The referee called the ball back and put it in play on the surfers' 30 yard line. Another hot discussion with the referee arose when Gilman intercepted a forward pass off the other team but the official saw it as an incomplete pass and put the ball into play at the old spot. The beachcombers forced the Outrigger back and a fumble on the three yard line almost gave the ball to the Wacs. Andrews dropped back to punt and Gilman blocked it; Rodriguez dropping on the ball and Gilman on top of him. Gilman kicked goal. The remainder of the game was spent in holding off the Outriggers who threatened but once to score, getting to the Wacs 20 yard line before losing the ball.

## JACK JOHNSON WINS BY KNOCKOUT ROUTE

LEAVENWORTH, Kansas, Nov. 25.—Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion of the world, knocked out Frank Owens of Chicago in the last round of a six-round bout, and then boxed "Topeka Jack" Johnson another five rounds at Federal prison here this afternoon.

In his bout with Owen, a 240-pound negro, Johnson knocked his opponent down 12 times during the contest before he finally sent him to the canvas with a terrific left hook to the jaw in the last round.

Before Johnson entered the ring he exhibited a bad abrasion on his right hand, and it was noticeable that he seldom used that member for his hard punches. He thus explained to newspaper men after the fight his inability to finish Owen sooner.

Johnson appeared to be in good condition and it was the opinion of ringside critics that the former champion is still a formidable fighter.

The ring was pitched in the prison ball park and the bout was witnessed by about 2000 prisoners and a few hundred invited guests.
