

# VARSIITY VS. OUTRIGGER TODAY; WAIKIKI AGAINST PALAMA GANG TOMORROW

Football Season Reaches High Tide With Star Teams Matched For Games That Have Vital Bearing On Island Championship; Each Game Starts At 3 P. M.

**T**WO good football games are on tap for the week-end. The first, which comes off at 3 o'clock today, is between the University of Hawaii and the fast Outrigger Club eleven. The second, between the Waikikis and the Palamas, is scheduled for tomorrow afternoon. Both games are to be played at Moiliili.

The game this afternoon has caused much comment, for it is a matter of opinion among the fans of the city that the Varsity is a strong contender for the championship and that the younger players will give the vets from the beach a hard fight for the honors. The Outriggers certainly have much in their favor. They

have one of the greatest coaches in the Islands, and with such men as Withington, Slade, Boyd, Fuller, Thompson, Anderson, Hollinger and Hart, the beach-combers are bound to be strong.

**Great Gobs of Gloom**  
Hard luck stories concerning injuries have been prevalent this week from three of the four football camps. The Outriggers have lost the services of Captain Edmund Parker, who piloted the team last week. He received severe injuries to his ankle and shin bone, and will not be in the game again this year. Parker is probably the only man who will be permanently out of it, but many others are still suffering from effects of the game with the Waikikis. Hiorth and Thompson have both been limping, but the beachcombers have been quite fortunate in losing but one of their regulars. They will present practically the same lineup that played last week, with Slade playing quarter in place of Parker.

The camp in Manoa valley, where Coach Elliot's men work out, is not so fortunate. Ruttman, tackle, is out of the game for this week and probably next week as well. He and Brash work well together and are a hard combination to beat. Hurley and Makalea should both show well on Sunday. Another man on the Pal eleven who is figured to give the Wacs something to think about is Sammy Hipsa, who is as slippery as an eel and is one of the receivers of Brash's passes. Beagle, at end, should play a stronger game than he did last week, and if he is right will make trouble for the Gilmanites. Schumaker, Parker and the rest of the lineup from the west end should give good accounts of themselves.
