

INTERCOLLEGIATE SEASON WILL END WITH A ROUSING WEEK-END FINISH

Waikiki-Varsity and Outrigger-Palama Contests Will Decide Title

This week brings to a close the major football schedule, and it will close with a decided bang. For, with all four teams tied for the lead, with a game won and a game lost, the fights this week-end for supremacy will be terrific. The Wacs and Varsity tangle on Saturday, and Sunday ends the series with the Outriggers and the Pals mixing it up.

There is just a slight chance of one team winning the championship, but this is a remote chance. The one chance is that one of the games end in a tie. This would give the championship to the winning team in the other game. But with the powerful scoring machines of the four teams working at full speed ahead there isn't much chance of a tie game. Both games should be hard-fought affairs, and the final outcome will not be clear until the full-time whistle ends the sessions. Should two teams end the season tied for first place, as is probably the way they will end up, there will be very little chance of their meeting to decide the supremacy until after Christmas, as a midweek game is impossible. It has already been suggested to play the deciding game, providing it is necessary on the day before Christmas. This would give the winner very little time to recuperate before the Nevada game on New Year's Day. Another way out of the mess is by having the Nevada game committee, composed of business men of Honolulu, decide who shall meet Nevada on New Year's.

Different Play

In the Wac-Varsity game the fans will see two different types of football played. The open play will be used by the Varsity as usual, and the Wacs, relying on their backfield to put the ball across. Aaron and Given will be back in the game. Whether Aaron will play is uncertain, as he is still weak as a result of his week's stay in the hospital. Given's knee still remains a problem for the Wacs to solve. Atherton Gilman, who suffered from a cracked rib and consequently did not play all of the game on Sunday, will in all probability be ready for the first whistle, and Pat O'Sullivan, who was also a cripple last week, should mend enough to start. This will insure the Wacs their strongest fight strength, and Gilman will undoubtedly use every ounce of it, for, with the Varsity team also in shape, the Wacs will have to go some to stop the Collegians when they start in their open work.

The Varsity, too, will come back this week with a repaired lineup. Hanahano will be able to play; Lambert, Conant and Captain King are in shape again for a gruelling game. Kinney, who has been out all season, will be in uniform again, and should be an asset to the Varsity with his accurate passing.

Caveman Stuff

The Palama-Outrigger game should be a contest of brawn. Both lines are strong and are stonewall defenses against line plunges. The Pals' backfield eclipses that of the beachcombers by quite a margin. But any backfield with Brash in it would be one to be reckoned with. The Pals went through the game last week in fine shape, with little or no injury. Brash is fast getting back his speed, and Sunday's game showed that Dusky is all that he ever was. The Outrigger lineup will not be bolstered to any large degree, as Parker will still be out and there is no successor to him as yet. Stickney should star along with Blade and Hart, but these three can hardly be expected to bear all the work of the beachcombers. Withington will put in his best lineup Sunday, for it is the last chance of the Outriggers to get in the New Year's game, and this has been the goal of every team this year.

All four teams are working hard for the games and the fans will turn out en masse this week to witness the two championship games.
