The world's five premier swimmers for this distance will be entered in this event alone. They are Warren and Pua Kealoha, Bill Harris, George Kane and Ludy Langer. All of this quintet were Olympic contenders. In addition to this list of marvels two other famous performers in the water will compete, they being Sam Kahanamoku and Mineville of the Outrigger Club.

Another event that is a headliner in itself is the 100-yard backstroke for men. Warren Kealoha, the world's champion in this branch of swimming, will compete against a field composed of Stubby Kruger, former champion; George Kane and J. Harris and

others, of like caliber.

In the 100-yard open competition Duke Kahanamoku and seven other competitors, all Olympic games participants, will be featured, offering the swimming fans the first oportunity to see the world's champion in sprint swimming in action, since his return from Antwero.
