

# SOCCER GAME TO PRECEDE OUTRIGGER - PALAMA GO AT MOILILI ON SUNDAY

## Tommy Muirhead and Geordie Low Will Head Two Teams That Will Play Exhibition Pre- liminary At the Football Park

Members of the colony of soccer players are warming up strong for the soccer game to be played as a preliminary to the Outrigger-Palama intercollegiate football game next Sunday at Moilili field. The original intention was to have the regular teams of the Healan and Ranger Clubs stage this exhibition, but owing to several of their star players taking part in the Outrigger-Palama game it was found necessary to make several substitutions. Many experts at the game offered their services and two All-Star teams will take the field under the colors of Rangers and Healanis, with Tommy Muirhead and Geordie Low to lead them into the fray. These two old timers have gathered a noble collection of stellar lights from the soccer firmament. Boney Scotland is in the lead with representatives, but Hawaii, California, New Zealand and England all furnish their quota of players.

### Three Brothers

Tommy Muirhead who, with his two younger brothers, just returned from the old country with all the latest wrinkles of the game up their sleeves, will make three of the Muirhead family of soccer experts to show their wares. Two other recent importations from Scotland in the persons of H. Philpotts and S. Killan are also included in Tommy's team. Then there's Bob Bevernick and J. S. Billisky, two experienced players who have kept the game alive in military circles for several years and who can hold their own in any man's soccer team. With these more or less new lights to Honolulu, Tommy has a number of well known men who have been with us long enough to have gained enviable reputations; such men as Jack Rosemond, (than whom there is no better center forward) Jimmy Sinclair, a chronic member of all-star teams, J. B. Walker and Alex. Ross, both old war horses at the game and very capable players.

### Geordie's Gang

Looks formidable, doesn't it? And yet Geordie Low has commandeered a platoon of men who are more than likely to beat Tommy Muirhead's aggregation. First he has the redoubtable Jimmie Greig who has been a leading light in the game for many moons. Jimmie's championship in the golf world hasn't dimmed his soccer record, nor his enthusiasm for the sport of his first choice, and he returned to his first love with all the pep and speed of a two-year-old. George McKinlay, recognized as one of the headiest and strongest exponents of the round ball pastime, as well as Alex Rattray, who has been playing the game since he was knee high to a grasshopper, are two valuable players whose experience will tell against the Muirhead crowd. Geordie also has a couple of imported experts on his string in Messrs. Martin and Kinnear, both of whom come with established reputations to maintain. Captain Low, doubtless recalling his days as an officer in the recent war, has selected a cracker-jack soccer player for his team who was also a fighter in the world war in the person of J. K. Robertson who has starred in many local soccer classics. Four other good men in C. Lewis, C. Kapakui, Wayson Williams and Abe Kalakua, all local boys who have made good will complete the team.

Athens' "Iowa Tennis" is the correct name for this popular game, grass courts are outnumbered one hundred to one by "hard" courts in this country. "Hard" courts may be clay, asphalt, cement, gravel, oiled, shell, dirt or wood. All courts except grass are known as hard courts. The upkeep of any "hard" court is much less expensive than that of a grass court. On the other hand "hard" courts are much harder on the wear and tear on tennis balls. A special ball known as No. "OOH," official has been constructed for "hard court" play that is not only particularly durable, but has many superior playing qualities.
