

Classy Quarter Men Will Be In Clash Tomorrow

Those who journey out to Mollili field tomorrow afternoon will probably see the hardest fought game of the present football season when the University of Hawaii and the Waikiki elevens clash in the closing act of the major league championship struggle. It will certainly be curtains for the loser, while the worst that can happen to the winner is to share title honors with the winner of Sunday's Outrigger-Palama game.

Coach Gilman's eleven will be reinforced tomorrow by the return of "Mac" Rosa, the diminutive quarterback who was injured in the Outrigger game, and old reliable Buck Aarons, who has been out of the game for a couple of weeks on account of sickness. The absence of these two men from the lineup last Sunday is given by many Waikiki supporters as the cause of their defeat at the hands of the Palamas.

Easy One?

Waikiki fans are claiming an easy victory over the collegians, in which case they are anxious to settle the championship dispute in a special game on December 26th with the winners of the Outrigger-Palama game.

With the exception of the change at quarterback and fullback the Waikiki lineup will be the same as usual with Bill Clark at center, Aylett and O'Sullivan at guard, Clark and Hart at tackle, Gilman and Rodrigues at end, Crabbe and Thurston at halfback.

Punting Duel

What promises to be one of the most interesting features of the contest may be a punting duel between Lydgate of the University and Gilman of the Waikikis. They are indisputably the best punters in the league and will probably clash in this department at frequent intervals tomorrow.

Both elevens are entering the game tomorrow with their full strength. The husky Varsity aggregation has at last found itself, and may be expected to show more power in attack and defense than at any previous appearance during the year. The Manoa men were slow to get under way, and were considerably battered about in a series of loosely played service games before the opening of the present major league schedule, but at last they are in the pink of condition with every man ready and anxious to get into the game.

Same Eleven

Elliot will probably open with practically the same eleven that opposed the Outriggers a week ago, that is: Center, King; guards, Jacobson and Mott-Smith; tackles, Lydgate and Hanohano; ends, Thompson and Kanahale; halfbacks, Lambert and Conant; fullback, Searle; quarterback, Spencer. Others who are almost certain to find their way into the contest are: Forbes at guard, Macconel at tackle, Suzuki and Tarlton at end, and Kinney at halfback. Ruttman may also get in at tackle for a portion of the game, although Elliot may prefer to save him for the Nevada game on Christmas day.

The Schuman-Gilman organization is just as determined to defeat the collegians as the latter are to win. As a matter of fact, it means
