

# Outriggers Win Right To Try Talent With the Sagebrushers

## Surfriders Gallop Away With Palama's Cohorts To Tune of 31 To 7: Backfield Feature of Day's Performance

It may have been the antiseptic drinking cups used by the Outriggers or it may have been that back field and an unyielding line, but at any rate the football team yesterday gave a severe and rather one sided walloping to the Palamas and virtually won the right to battle with the Sagebrushers on New Year's Day.

But that it might have been the team, for the Outriggers put up a brilliant exhibition yesterday that would have been hard to eclipse. Backed up with Slade, Searle and Hoopli from the Panahou district the surfriders romped up and down the field almost at will and piled up a total of thirty-one points to the Palamas seven.

Four men reached the pinnacle of local fame in yesterday's game for the Outriggers. They were Searle, Hoopli, Slade and Hart. Stickney also played brilliantly.

### From Combines

"Pump" Searle and Hoopli proved just the men needed in the Outrigger backfield to make passing forward a better than fifty-fifty certainty. Slade proved his generalship in the position of quarterback and put his team through its paces in a fashion that served to bewilder the Pals. Searle was featured from the beginning of the game and tore through the line time after time for immense gains. Hoopli was following suit throughout. Hart proved to be a wizard at finding the weak spots in the line, while Stickney made many gains around the ends.

Outrigger's line was working perfectly, yielding just enough to make for perfect interference. Most of the splendid plays by the backs were due to the line interference offered by the host at all stages of the game.

Palama played well, but seemed to be slow. Brash did not get many opportunities for his customary spectacular play. Malla and Hakalena were two of the men who stood out in bold relief for the Pals. Palama tried for almost three quarters to find a way of breaking through the line with no success. Finally, by a series of forward passes, a score was put over that saved a goose egg for the Pals.

Outrigger had the game well in hand nearly all through the contest. Only three times was there any danger of a serious rally by the Pals before the score grew too lopsided to be worried over.

### Fumbles First

The game opened with Outrigger kicking off. After receiving the kick one of the Palama backs dropped it while running and it was recovered by Outrigger. Outrigger next pulled a couple of butter-fingered plays, and it looked as though the game might become a comedy of errors. Both teams suffered in the next few minutes of play, however, and settled down to splendid football. Searle was sent in for five backs early in the game and succeeded admirably. Outrigger then fumbled some more and the ball was in their danger zone when they took possession and punted out.

A series of forward passes brought the battle into Palama's territory in the last part of the first quarter. Two of these, from Searle to Hoopli and from Slade to Searle, brought the pile-up to the 10-yard line of the opposition. Hart was sent in for a five-yard gain for the Surfers just as the whistle blew for the end of the quarter.

Outrigger tried two plunges that failed in getting. There was a heated argument about the matter of making distance, and the spectators got their first thrill of the afternoon. Palama finally got the ball, but fumbled the snap back. A quick recovery was made, but the desperate punt went way offside. Outrigger took possession of the ball.

### The First Score

A few minutes later a fake pass gave Searle a chance to gain four yards. Hart went through on the third attack in this phase of the battle and wriggled through the writhing mass of linemen for a touchdown. Withington kicked the goal. Score, 7 to 0.

After the next kick-off Hoopli went through for a 20-yard gain. He followed this with an end run that totaled 10 more. His next play was a pass to Searle, which gave that gentleman a chance to snake along for the full distance on the first down. Harley went in for K. Hips. Two more plunges gave Outriggers their 10 yards and brought the ball to the 15-yard line. Hoopli advanced it to within four yards of the goal line. Coulterjohn was sent in for Kahamamoku for Outrigger. Hoopli wriggled across the chalk mark for the touchdown with a grand sport. Withington kicked the goal. Score, 14 to 0.

Joe Stickney was sent to replace Hoopli and lost a yard in his first attempt at an end run. Andrews was sent in for Hart. Stickney made a thrilling run of fifty yards that gave the stands a chance to howl themselves hoarse. Bailey went in for Huddy for the Pals just before the half ended.

Searle took the kick-off and ran it back thirty yards with fine interference preceding him. Stickney went through for the distance on the first down. He next broke into the line with a forty-two-yard run that gave Outrigger another touchdown. Withington kicked the goal. Score 21-0.

### Palama's Deep Stuff

Palama pulled a weird play after the kick-off. Sam Hips slipped over on the side lines, on the line of scrimmage, and before his presence was marked he was the receiving end of the forward pass. This play caught Outrigger napping and gained fifty yards for the Pals. A pass to Malla for a touchdown was nullified by an offside called that cost the Pals five yards. Another forward pass was attempted and wrecked by Searle. Brash suddenly shot a pass to Sam Hips who dropped behind the line for Palama's only time across. The goal kick just skimmed the bar. Score 21 to 7.

Outrigger pulled an offside immediately play was resumed. They punted next and Withington recovered the ball after Makalena had fumbled it. This brought the play to the forty-yard line on Palama's side of the lot.

## Doings Today

### TRACK

Palama penalized fifteen yards for holding and the ball was Outrigger's on the first down. A few minutes of another score were apparent. Outrigger then got too out a center and was penalized fifteen yards for holding. A pass from Slade to Thompson gained ten yards. Stickney advanced five yards and put the ball directly in front of the goal posts at a distance of four yards. Outrigger attempted a forward pass which turned into a touchback. Another went in. Malla.

Palama chased the Outriggers away from the danger zone by a desperate rally. Searle then took an end run forward pass thirty-five yards down the field with a wild run. After a short and futile scrimmage Searle dropped one over the bar from a distance of thirty-four yards. Score 24 to 7.

On the next play Searle missed a punt that was recovered by Palama. Brash tried to go through the line and gained five yards. The quarter ended here.

### Grandstand Battle

Shortly after the third quarter got under way a noble battle commenced in the grandstands. The general panic, convinced by now that Outrigger had the game on ice, attended in a body with the result that during practically the entire last quarter John Doe et al were straws along the sidelines in violation of all the principles dear to the heart of manager J. A. Beauvais.

When the excitement died down and the spectators once more took a look at the game it was discovered that Searle had been replaced by Hart. Hart and Stickney then did some deadly work that saved their goal from violation at the hands of the enemy. Bryant went in for Thompson. Palama took the ball on the fumble by Outrigger on their own seven yard line. They punted out. Andrews ran the play back ten yards. Hart broke through for a ten-yard gain. A pass in perfect form from Slade to Bryant netted another touchdown for the Outriggers and Withington again kicked the goal. Score 31 to 7.

Brash's most brilliant play came on the kick-off when he took the ball for a sixty-yard trip down the field in spite of all efforts to stop him. Palama was penalized fifteen for holding in this quarter. The rest of the game was good football but uninteresting. It consisted chiefly in Outrigger's merely holding their opponents while the latter struggled desperately for another score or so which they did not get.
