

# GRIDIRON ELEVENS EAGER FOR OPENING WHISTLE OF NEW YEAR'S DAY CLASH

Tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock the last football game of the season will be staged on Alexander field when the University of Nevada and the Outriggers clash in what the dopsters say is going to be the greatest game ever staged in Hawaii. What the outcome will be nobody knows, but the prospects are bright for a real battle, and the fan who misses the game is cheating himself.

The Outrigger club is tied with the University of Hawaii for the championship of the islands, each having won two and lost one game. This fact would seem to indicate that Nevada would hold a slight edge on the surridors, for the Sagebrushers defeated the local collegians on Christmas Day by 14 to 9 in the cleanest, hardest game ever witnessed in Honolulu. However, the Outriggers have strengthened their squad since they met the Wahoo aggregation three weeks ago, and for that matter, their supporters have stoutly maintained their superiority over the Manoa eleven, even after they had tied for the island title. For this reason the comparative scores of the two island teams against the invaders will be watched with a great deal of interest by local fans.

## Different

Certainly the Outriggers are a different eleven than when they played their regular schedule. The addition of "Pump" Searle and "Nick" Hoopli to the backfield has entirely revised their attack. Atherton Gilman playing at right tackle will also be a strong barrier against the line plunging tactics which the Nevadans used in the Christmas game. The Beachcomber line will outweigh that of the visiting team, and there are no bantams on it. Another advantage the Outriggers will have is in their large squad of substitutes with which they can replace tired or injured players.

Coach Withington will probably start the excitement with Anderson at center, Hiorth and Boyd at guards, Withington and Gilman at tackles, Thompson and Fuller at ends, Hoopli and Stickney at halfbacks, Searle at fullback and Slade at quarter.

For Nevada the same lineup will probably start tomorrow as opened the intercollegiate melee last Saturday. The Sage hens are confident that they will be able to repeat the Christmas Day performance and some of them even hint that it may be still more so. They claim to be in better fighting condition after their long ocean voyage, and to be more conditioned to the climate. It is more probable that they will use a completely new method of attack against the heavy Outrigger line than that employed to defeat Hawaii university, and the spectators may be treated to an exhibition of something entirely new in the way of an overhead game.

The game starts sharply at 3 o'clock, and the seating arrangement is the same as at the Christmas game.

## WHO, WHEN, WHERE OF TOMORROW'S BATTLE

Time—3 p. m. New Year's Day.  
Place—Alexander field, Punahou academy.

Contestants—Outrigger Canoe club vs. University of Nevada for championship of the Pacific.

How to get there—Take Punahou car going east on Fort St.

Entrance—At ewa end of the field. Those having seats in sections A, 1 to 8, and B, 1 to 7, go to the mauka side. Those having seats in sections A, 9 to 16, and B, 8 to 14, will go to the makai side. Those in section C, 1 to 6, will go to the bleachers in ewa end of the field.

Automobiles—All motor vehicles will enter at ewa end of field and exit at waikiki end. Parking space on the gridiron (all spaces now sold) will enter at ewa end and circle field by the mauka road. All other cars must be parked in lower Punahou field.

## SURFERS OUTWEIGHED NINETY-SEVEN POUNDS

The Outrigger Canoe club is outweighed by 97 pounds for the game with the University of Nevada tomorrow at Alexander field. That means about eight pounds to the man.

The weights of the men on the Outrigger team have been given as follows:

### Weights

Thompson, 155; Kahanamoku, 165; Withington, 185; Anderson, 190; Hjorth, 168; Gilman, 180; Fuller, 160; Slade, 155; Hart, 155; Hoopli, 145, and Searle, 145.

The weights of the men on the University of Nevada team have been given as follows:

Martin, 160; Colwell, 230; Buckman, 190; Heward, 170; M. Fairchild, 180; Grant, 190; T. Fairchild, 175; Reed, 250; Johnson, 157; Bradshaw, 140.

The total weight of the Outrigger team is 1800 pounds, while the total weight of the Nevada team is 1897 pounds. The local backfield weighs in at 600 pounds, while Nevada backfield weighs 602 pounds. In the line the Surfers have 1200 pounds against 1295 for Nevada.

The team average for the Outrigger is 173 pounds, while it is 181 for Nevada. The backfield average for the Surfers is 150 pounds and Nevada is about the same. The line average for the Outriggers is 171 pounds as against 183 for Nevada.
