Herman Clarke was an easy winner with a new record. The others finished in the order named above. The hammer throw finals which were completed Thursday went to Lehman, Cruickshank, Searle and Kanae, respectively.

Dick Gartley grabbed off first place in the pole vault without having to go to 12 feet to do it. With another week in which to workout he should be in a fair way to go after his island mark of 12 feet 10 7-8 inches. Harold Harvey, also of the Outrigger club, finished second over Correa of Palama and Tanimura of the Varsity, third and fourth men. Ching of the Varsity won the broad jump with a leap of 21.4 1-2. Tremblay of the 13th Field Artillery hit his stride on his second attempt and took second over Correa of the Pals and Ralph Ault of the O. C. C. tribe, who took third and fourth respectively.

M. Hartman, jumping for the Deans, was one of the big sensations of the day when he went into the air five feet eleven inches and took first place away from Mel Carter of the Outrigger squad in the high jump. Hartman did it on his last try after Carter had failed to go over. He hit the bar but the cross piece stayed put and another "dark horse" had romped in front. Maltbie Holt took third for the Pals and Walter Holt was fourth for the Deans.

Eddie Fernandez defeated Ray Melim in a close race in the 220-yard low hurdles. Whittle took third and Johnny Morse was fourth. The time was :26 1-5. Akai, Naiwi, Castanha and Kahoiwai ran to fame in the two-mile relay for Palama when they copped from the University and Outriggers in 8:48 1-5. Castanha and Kahoiwai showed their class and put considerable distance between themselves and the second place Deans.

### TOUGH LUCK

Johnny Morse had tough luck in the high hurdles for after winning them in :16 4-5 he was disqualified for knocking over three flights. Akau of the Varsity nosed out John Watt of the O. C. C. and was awarded first place. Robinson finished third, but was also disqualified, and Thomas and Poepoe took the two remaining places. The quarter mile relay was a speedy event and a fight from start to finish between the Outrigger and Varsity teams. Freitas, Giles, Jones and Farden running for the beach club won out by about six feet over the Deans. Palama was third and the Coast Defense was fourth. The time was :44 2-5.
