

Trials For Track Meet Look Good

Prelims Tomorrow Will
Bring Out Some Hot

WHOS who on the track and field will probably be largely decided tomorrow afternoon when the trials for the A.A.U. meet are staged at Kanehaneha field. A lot of the boys are due to take a flop tomorrow and just as many will rise into prominence, for the trials in all of the events will produce some of the closest competition of the championship meet.

There are several athletes of prominence in these parts who will be out after scalps tomorrow. First of all there is John Watt. The former world's champ was beaten twice by Johnny Morse of the Varsity squad in the Rainbow meet. Once Morse was disqualified—but the Dean led Watt at the finish and that's that. Watt will be out to regain his prestige, and it will be a beautiful struggle in the 120-yards high hurdles between the two leaders. Akau of the Varsity is also to be reckoned with in this event.

CARTER WORKING HARD

Milton Carter, Outrigger high jumper, and holder of the island record for the event took a fall last Saturday when Hartman of the Deans copped the jump from him. Tomorrow Carter will attempt to stage the old comeback and trim the Dean jumper. Wille Wise lost his javelin record to Jim Cruickshank last week and he will be out to retrieve his lost honors this week. There are many who predict another upward movement for the javelin mark.

FAST 220 EVENT

The furlong will bring out the fastest sprinters in the islands and incidentally there is a little grudge to be settled between Bill Jones of O. C. C. squad and Ted Hair of the Varsity. Last week Hair and Jones staged a pretty 220 lap as anchor men on their respective relay teams with the decision going to the Dean. This week Jones will attempt to put one over on his rival and whether these two are fighting for first or last place, they will hit the finish mark with all they have. The 220 field looks particularly strong with Tasaka, Cabrinha, Chun, Peshallow, Bernie Farden and the two above named stars as the main contestants.

The fans will have an opportunity of watching Burt Hooper, Outrigger distance star, at his best Saturday. Hooper has one of the prettiest strides ever seen on a local track and when he swings into action Saturday he will be worth watching. Castana, a local product, will also be out in force in the longer grinds.

MAY BREAK RECORD

Robert Deverill, holder of the interscholastic record for the quarter at :31 2-5 is entered in the 440. This week he will meet the best in the territory at his own distance and it is probable that the time in the A. A. U. will be under that of the interschol. Eddie Fernandez is looked upon by Otto Klum to turn the Punahou star back in this event.

The trials in all the field events including the hammer throw finals and track events up to and including the quarter will be held at Kanehaneha tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock.
