Farden, Hair Feature in the Sprints

MORSE MEETS WATT

TRACK FANS who journey out to Kamehameha field this afternoon are in for real entertainment. For the A.A.U. championship meet today promises to be the classiest exhibition of track and field competition ever staged in these islands. Not only will the individual events be hotly contested today but the three leading teams look to be about evenly matched—on paper. Outrigger is favored by some, while just as many point to the Varsity as the probable winner. Palama should make a good showing, although it is admitted by the experts that the Pals stand only an outside chance for victory.

Taken individually, the participants in today's championships represent the classiest field of entrants ever to grace a local track. One of the big drawing cards today is the 120-yard high hurdles event in which Johnny Morse and Akau of the Dean squad will be pitted against John Watt, Outrigger, former world's champion. Morse still has to qualify in a trial heat today, but the big Dean should have little trouble in coming out in front in the prelim. Morse has improved steadily throughout the season and is favored to win from the record holder but Watt has rounded into something like his old form and should put up a hard scrap to maintain his prestige.

FARDEN AND HAIR MEET

The sprints today will finally give Ted Hair, Dean, and Bernie Farden, Outrigger, the chance they both have been asking for since the Rainbow meet. The two speedsters will be matched in the century semi-final and final and will meet again in the furlong. They both won their heats in the prelims in exactly the same time but according to the dope Farden is favored in the 100 and Hair has the edge in the longer race. Besides the two favorites, the sprint field numbers Tasaka, Jones, Penhallow, Ching and Deverill among the outstanding stars. Both the 100-yard dash and 220 yards should bring the fans to their feet from the crack of the starter's gun.

Herbert Deverill of the Outrigger stables will be favored over the field of nine in the quarter. He smashed the Interskol record this year and is in fine shape for the big meet. If the track is dry today
