Cerney Cracks Old Marks in Two-Mile, One-Mile; Kam Star, Kahoiwai, Big Point Winner; Army Records 37 Points

RUNNING true to pre-meet predictions Wilder Parker's Palama tracksters brought a banner Hawaii season to a close yesterday when they walked off with high honors in the annual A.A.U. carnival, scoring 63 points to Outrigger's second place winner, 47. "Spud" Harrison's Deans placed third with 46 digits, while Schofield, representing the Army, came next with 37. Bell, competing unattached, scored 12 points.

WELL-BALANCED SQUAD

With the cream of the islands on their squad, the Palama team scored in all but two events, failing to register in the 220 yard dash and the discus throw. The Parker machine took third in the half-mile relay but were disqualified.

CERNEY SMASHES RECORDS

Frank Cerney, diminutive "Schofield Express", who leaves Tuesday for the Olympic tryouts in Boston, smashed the only records lowered during the afternoon, lowering his former record in the mile, and later on in the day, his own mark for the two mile. Cerney covered the mile in 4 minutes 39 3-5 seconds, and the two mile in 10 minutes 8 3-5 seconds. Cerney's old mark in the mile was lowered by 2-5 of a second and in the two mile by 5 and 4-5 seconds.

The little Army flash was pressed in the mile by "Toots" Harrison, Palama iron man. Harrison stayed with Cerney until the home stretch in the last lap when the Army star stepped away from him to win handily and crash the record. In the two mile, the little fellow had to run a race by himself as he outclassed everyone on the field winning by about 220 yards. Cerney's running showed the island fans that he certainly rates the chance he is getting to tryout for the Olympic games.

RAY MELIM SPARKLES

Ray Melim, garbed in the O.C.C. colors grabbed the individual honors of the day when he turned in three first places and in addition ran anchor on the winning half-mile relay team. In the 220 hurdles, Melim came back after a rather poor showing last week, and equaled John Watt's island record for this event, covering the timber infested 220 yard jaunt in 25 4-5 seconds. The Surriders' star stepped the 100 yard dash in 10:2 to break the tape some two yards ahead of his rivals. In the 220 yard dash, this same star out sprinted everyone on the cinders, making it a clean sweep for himself in the sprints.

KABOIWAI TAKES TWO

George Kahoiwai, stellar Warrior flyer, running for Palama, again grabbed singular honors for himself when he outclassed "Buz" Smith of the Outrigger club. Kahoiwai took the lead from the very start and was never headed. Smith, on the other hand, was boxed at the start, and came through at the finish to nose out Forrest. Kahoiwai was just too much for the field, setting a killing pace right off the reel and never weakening. In the 880 run, George again strutted his stuff and carried off the honors with ease to bring to a close one of the most spectacular years ever had by a high school athlete.

DEMELLO IN FIELD EVENTS

De Mello, giant Palama field artist captured the honors in this class registering first places in the shot put and hammer throw, and second place in the javelin throw.

McCann of Schofield captured the javelin throw while Gorsuch annexed a win in the discus.

"FLYING COP" PERFORMS

In a special event, "Kahuku" the "Flying Cop" made Eddie Hoch look like a small when he stepped the 100 yard dash for the Cecil Benny, of Dawkins and Benny, trophy in one minute flat. The No Sale League flash failed to get under way. On the other hand, the monster cop got away with the gun and seemed to coast the entire distance.

Kelby Is Bitten By Track Bug

Mainland Athlete Gets Out the Old Spiked Shoes Again

AMONG the old timers who competed in the impromptu track meet held on Alexander field last Wednesday was W. F. Kelby, who as soon as he read of the plans for holding the carnival, dug into trunks laden with treasure he has collected

during several years of travel on every continent; and resurrected his old track shoes. They were the same spiked shoes he has worn several years ago in stepping over the hurdles and in running in relay teams.

Kelby also competed in cross-country runs and in marathons. One of his rivals in the Rocky Mountain News Marathon (Littleton to Denver) was Seth Gonzales who won Monday's lap of Pyle's Coast-to-Coast Bunion Derby. While captain of the East Denver High School cross-country squad, Kelby lowered the existing time over the course.

In addition to competing on athletic teams of various schools and clubs, he passed the requirements for entrance to Sigma Delta-Chi, National Intercollegiate Athletic Fraternity. Candidates for this Honorary Athletic Fraternity must equal marks set in sixteen events; such as sprinting, pole vaulting, hurdling, running, swimming, walking, jumping, football punting, etc. Varsity letters, earned on the major teams, may be substituted in lieu of failure to pass any of the requirements.

Wednesday was the second time Kelby entered track and field competition since his farewell as captain of the University of Colorado Track team. By a singular coincidence, both occasions have been in Hawaii. His previous performance here was in the Hawaiian A. A. U. championship meet of 1923. At that time he was a member of the winning Palama team and was pitted against Krogness of Harvard in the hurdler. He was then in charge of the Standard Oil fuel oil plant.

Kelby took his third trip around the world in 1924 and the following year he was with the Continental Oil Company, where he was a forward on the basketball team. His next move was to enter Chicago Technical College in order to complete his studies and after his graduation he came back to Honolulu where he is now a general building contractor.
