

# FORMER BUFFANBLU STAR TAKES OVER REINS ON MONDAY

Eddie Kendall, Head Track Coach at Fighting Micks' Camp Announces Acquisition of Erstwhile Punahou, Outrigger Canoe Club Pit Satellite

**W**AYSON "CY" WILLIAMS, erstwhile Punahou and Outrigger Canoe Club pit star, and joint Cornell Relay Games pole vault record holder, will coach the McKinley High school pit and field men this season. This announcement came from the Fighting Micks' camp yesterday through Eddie Kendall, Micks' track tutor for '29.

Coach Kendall has some hundred tracksters already going through their paces. Cy Williams will meet his pitmen for the first time Monday when he intends to immediately impart the fine points of the various pit events which he collected in some eight years of prep and A. A. U. competition.

## HAS FINE RECORD.

Williams' record as a pit star is exceptionally good. He first broke into sports prominence in 1919 as a member of the Punahou track team.

He continued as a member of the Buffanblu track team, featuring in pole vault and high jump, throughout his four years in high school and closed his prep career by crashing the Cornell pole vault mark in 1922 jointly with Sam Hipa at Kamehameha field. Both he and Hipa cleared the bar at 11 feet 8 3-4 inches.

## Micks Name Raymond, Harrison Captains

**T**HE Fighting Micks' gridgers gathered at a banquet given in their honor at the Army and Navy Y. M. C. A. last night and unanimously elected "Red" Raymond, superlative Black and Gold backfield performer, and Pat Harrison, crack tackle, to the joint captaincy of the '29 squad. The Irish warriors of the gridiron had everything arranged and within a minute selected their leaders for the coming campaign.

Red Raymond closed a brilliant season while Harrison was kept on the sidelines practically all season.

Principal Miles Cary lauded the boys for fine showing and especially congratulated them on their fighting spirit. Frank "Rockne" Hluboky was toastmaster for the blowout and added additional spice to the sumptuous "turkey and trimmings" feast with his peppy and humorous introductions.

After being graduated from Punahou, Williams competed under the Outrigger colors and continued to gather points in the pit events.

At McKinley he will find nothing but a bunch of green but willing beginners. The fruits of his labors will hardly be expected to bear this year, but should leave the Micks with a wonderful nucleus for next year, as Williams intends to start from the bottom with the Black and Gold pit prospects.

## PROSPECTS FOR SEASON

The Micks' prospects for the season do not look exceptionally rosy. On the cinders, Coach Kendall will have mostly green men to work with. In Kufferath, Indie, Imamoto and Forrest, he has a foursome that should collect some points for the Irish squad. Incidentally, this is the crack Mills one-fourth mile relay team that showed so well in the never to be forgotten one-lap event of last year, when St. Louis finished first, Micks second and Punahou third, a complete reversal of the pre-meet dope.

Like Williams, Head Coach Kendall intends to build for the future. He reports that his boys are the most enthusiastic and willing bunch of fellows he has ever worked with and consequently feels that he should bring them along slowly. Be that as it may, the Micks will have a strong team in this year's track meets.
