

VOLLEYBALL LEAGUE NOTES AND CHATTER

This week's secondary contests—all at Palama—are: Wednesday: Central "Y" vs. Firemen and Palama vs. A. C. A.—"A" section; and Pines vs. Kalihl and Firemen vs. Palama on Thursday night in the "B" league.

The following week the two-out-of-three finals will begin for the sectional winners, unless there are upsets this week. Most of the other teams will enter a Consolation Tournament to be staged at the same time and to be open to the outfits not rating the finals, with the same players to be used. The Secondary Season will close May 16th, and Senior League, May 21st.

The Ulu Ilima and Palama Clubs are leading the Citywide Senior Women's League which opened at the Y. W. C. A., Wednesday night. Two good games are on tap this Wednesday at the same place, Kalihis vs. Pines and Palama vs. H. A. C.

At 3 o'clock this afternoon, the Kaimuki and Kauluwela teams clash at the Kawalahao recreation center for the Citywide volleyball championship.
