THAT the Army track squad will make a strong bid for the honors in the Rainbow Relay Carnival Saturday was manifested yesterday in the trials at Kam field when the doughboys qualified 14 men for the finals. Palama, reputed as the strongest club registered 13 while the University of Hawaii placed 10 men. Outrigger qualified 7, Nuuanu "Y" 3 and Central "Y" 1.

Army placed in every event. The 100-novice and pole vault were their best bets, three doughboys registering in each of these events. Palama made its haul in the novice, hurdles and high jump, while the College Boys showed exceptional power in the field events.

### STARS LOOK GOOD

The star performers all looked good yesterday and ruled in their respective classes. "Cabby" Cabrinha, St. Louis College flash wearing the Palama colors, stepped a 102½ hundred in the first trial heat. Ray Melim flashed some of his old time form in the 220 hurdles while Hung Wal Ching of Nuuanu "Y" featured in the broad jump with a leap of 21 feet, 10 inches, crashing the record.

Lewis, crack Army vaulter, drew many an eye and easily indicated that he will be in the final running Saturday.
