

# DASH EVENTS WILL ECLIPSE ANY IN HISTORY of COMPET

100-Yards with Murai, Melim, Ventura and Cabrinha Promises to Be a Corker—Forlong Will Also Be Breath-Taker—Record Expected to Fall in 440-Dash

**T**HREE of the greatest races in history of local A. A. U. track and field competition loom for the annual affair Saturday at Kamehameha field, where some 200 hundred tracksters will gather for the '29 championships.

These three events are: 100-yard open, 220 dash and 440 dash.

In the 100, Walter Murai, Cabby Cabrinha, Ray Melim, and Al Giles, premier local sprint stars will stack their prowess against that of Joe Silva and Ventura, highly touted Maui stars. The race without the Maui stars would be a wow but with the two Valley Island comets entered, competition will be all the keener. Then there is that feud between Murai and Ventura that has to be settled. Be it remembered that Ventura nosed out the McKinley lad in the inter-island meet.

This same field with Dick Penhallow, Hung Wai Ching and Ome added to the list will battle for the tape in the furlong. Murai and Melim alone could put on a race for kings. With all these other cyclones leaving with the gun, we ask you, what kind of a race should one expect?

## RECORD SHOULD FALL

Without a doubt, the 440 will be the feature race on the program. This is the event that Maui has her eye on. She expects Ventura to kick dust in the locals' faces but he'll have to run a 50-second lap to do it. J. P. Jones of the Army, George Kahoiwai and Kufferath of Palama, Waketake and Giles of the University and Billie Mountcastle, also of Maui will be bunched, no doubt about that. Jones was clocked at 49 4-5 seconds in his lap in the 1-mile relay Saturday and will be out in front. There'll be a mad scramble for the pole. Someone is going to get boxed but it's going to be a whale of a race.

And these three record breaking events will be only part of the meet. The half-mile, mile and two-mile runs are going to be corkers. Cerny, Schofield express, is going after new marks in the mile and two mile while Kahoiwai intends to test the record in the half mile. The half-mile relay also promises to be a corker. Maui will have a crack team in the event and will endeavor to make it tough for the Pals.
