SCHOFIELD SPEED KING

On the shoulders of the diminutive Frank Cerny, holder of two records, rests the responsibility of the shattering of two marks. Cerny is expected to crash his own mile run mark and to either break the two mile mark or furnish such keen competition that the winner will have to better the old mark. Cerny is known as the "Schofield Express." He has unusual fine stamina and power.

Cerny's own teammates will pace him in the mile event, among them being Eddie Nather, Boyd, Aubree and Vereheart. In the two miles, both Aubree and Nather are expected to shine and there is strong possibility that one of them can win the race with a new record.

BIG BROTHER'S MARK

Percy Smith, University of Hawaii crack hooper, is out to put the old mile walk record in the ash can. The present record is held by brother Jimmy Smith but Percy looks quite capable of replacing the "J" with a capital "P" in the record books. Percy should break the record by a couple of seconds. Jack Myatt his teammate will give Smith all the pressing he wants.

Ray Mellim ought to be in finer shape than ever now and should be able to topple the 220 yards obstacle mark hung up by J. Watt and himself. Last week Mellim was clocked for the event in 26 seconds flat, a fifth behind the mark. Hung Wai Ching of the Nuuanu Y and Kam Tai Lee of the Deans will probably be the main rivals for the blue ribbon.

BEST MEN IN HISTORY

L. Ware's quarter mile achievement which had stood the test for over a decade may give place to a better mark ere the meet is over. With the fastest quarter-milers competing in the history of track, it is not surprising to see Ware's 50.2-5 seconds mark put away. Jones, of the Army, who was unofficially clocked around 49.3-5 sec., Ventura of Maui, Yorlo Wakatake of the University of Hawaii and George Kahoiwai and Siegfried of Palama Settlement will be the main fighters for the blue ribbon.

Wilder Parker's Palama half mile relay team looks good to come within the record held by the Outrigger Canoe Club. Yamaguchi, Walter Mural, Eddie Cabrinha and Raymond Mellim will be the Pal cinder burners in the relay race.
