

ARMY LANDS 19 PLACES IN A.A.U. CINDER TRIALS

Palamas Suffer Loss of Several Athletes; Deans Get 15 Places

Army representatives carried away the most places in the 1929 A. A. U. track and field meet trials held yesterday afternoon at Kamehameha field for today's carnival.

The Schofield athletes landed 19 berths, while the Palama and University of Hawaii stalwarts each claimed 15 berths. The Outrigger Canoe club and the Nuuanu "Y" teams each gathered seven places, while Maui annexed four posts and the Central "Y" one.

A feature of the trials yesterday was the disappointing showing of the Palama team. Coach Wilder Parker's charges failed to display the strength expected of them. Their dismal showing could be accounted for by the fact that Eddie Cabrinha, one of the winged "P's" sprint aces, underwent a minor operation early this week, that Ray Melim slightly strained a leg ligament during practice and that George Indie, Danny Wise, George Todd and a couple other Palama point winners were busily engaged in prep school baseball contests.

All the above athletes, with the exception of Melim, did not perform yesterday in the trials and are naturally out of the meet.

Nuuanu "Y" Strong

One mild surprise is the showing of the little "Y" team. It garnered seven places and will no doubt cut in heavy on the totals of the title contenders. The University of Hawaii athletes, coached by L. B. ("Spud") Harrison, were another surprise by pulling 15 places. The Deans were strong in the field events.

Manuel De Mello, record holder in the shot put event and all-around field man, who arrived this morning from a trip to the coast, was ruled out from competition by the coaches because he could not participate in the trials. The same rule was applied to two Maui athletes who arrived this morning.

The Army enters the meet today favorite to win, with the Rainbows nosing out Palama for second place and Nuuanu "Y" outscoring the Outrigger charges for fourth honors.
