

MANY MERMAIDS AND MERE MEN ENTER FOR CARNIVAL WEEK SWIMMING MEET

Lady Langer Only Notable Out, Duke Kahanamoku, Kruger, Lane, Keli and Others Will Compete—Women Not At All Backward, For All Local Feminine Stars Will Be In the Game

Two dozen events are on the cards for the big A. A. U. Mid-Pacific Carnival swimming meet to be held in the Y. M. C. A. tank on Friday and Saturday nights of this week.

On Friday night there will be ten swimming races, a woman's relay and the plunge for distance, while on Saturday evening there will be staged ten swimming races, exhibition springboard diving and men's relay.

With the exception of Lady Langer, who is now at the officers' training camp in Schofield Barracks preparing for a commission in Uncle Sam's army, practically all the local stars have been entered in the men's races.

The list is headed by Duke P. Kahanamoku and after him come Harold Kruger, Clarence Lane, John Keli, Fred W. Wilhelm, Vincent Genoves, Mitrie Konowaloff and a host of others, among the latter being game aspirants for honors entered under the colors of the Outrigger Club. There are all nationalities there and the coming meet might just as well be termed an international one.

Girls Not Backward At All

The women—they are all girls—are not taking a backward seat in the proceedings, either, for there are dozens of contestants entered, the rivalry being keenest among those who will swim under the colors of the Palama and Outrigger mermaid clubs.

The coming meet will see the first Japanese girl as an entrant in Honolulu. She is Miss Yoshino Maniwa, who will cut the water under the Palama colors.

Well Known Horse Driver Passes Away On Mainland

A. L. MacDonald, Who Held Ribbons Here On Carmalita, Dies In San Francisco

A. L. MacDonald, who came here from the Coast the middle of last year to drive Carmalita in the June races, died in San Francisco on January 21, last, after a general nervous breakdown. In his last illness he was attended by four physicians, but their united skill was unable to pull him through.

News of Mr. MacDonald's death was received in the last mail by C. H. Judd of Kunlou, this Island, from Coast friends. Mr. MacDonald made many friends during his short stay in Honolulu last year, among these being Mr. Judd, for whom he purchased "Zerene," the Swanny mare. He was a quiet, jovial and square man in all his dealings and his track record was above reproach.

MacDonald drove Carmalita here in two events against El Oro and Blazer and against El Oro in Maui, he winning all three races.

CAPTAINS AND COACHES OF SWIM TEAMS MEET

FORMER WORLD'S CHAMP FINALLY LAID TO REST

Funeral of John L. Sullivan Attended By Many Friends

BOSTON, February 6.—Final tribute to a great champion was paid today when the body of John L. Sullivan was buried in Calvary Cemetery. In the crowds that lined the snow-filled streets as the casket was borne from the home of Sullivan's sister, Mrs. Annie Lennon, to St. Paul's Church, where the funeral mass was celebrated, were scores of children bidding farewell to their big "pal," whose waterword was courage and who regaled them with stories of kings and presidents he had met.

Leaders of the temperance movement were there to testify to their regard for the man who boasted that his greatest victory was gained when he conquered drink. Many were there also whom the former champion had helped in their hour of need, while neighbors journeyed from his former home in Abington, Nor did the sporting fraternity forget their once great idol, and they came in numbers from far and near. The burial was in Calvary at Forest Hills, beside the body of Sullivan's wife.

James J. Corbett, who wrested the championship from Sullivan more than a score of years ago, was not present. Corbett sent a floral offering and telegraphed his regrets that he would be unable to come here for the funeral.

There was no funeral oration at the church, as many had expected, nor was the casket opened.
