

Duke Makes Record Time In Last Lap of Relay Feature

Watch Clocked Him in 29 4-5 Seconds—No Official Time—Healanis Win Meet From Palama—Little Edith Kenn Startles Spectators By Her Performance in Various Events—Palama Settlement Brings Out New Stars—Mix-up, Too

Duke Kahanamoku once more demonstrated that he is the premier swimmer of the universe when he unofficially set a world's record for the 60-yard event at the swimming meet at the Y. M. C. A. on Saturday evening. An army man clocked Duke for the distance in 29 4-5 seconds, which is one second faster than the time made by Daniels.

The relay was the big event of the evening and it was anyone's race for the first three laps. The Healanis started out well and passed Palama, and the Hui Nalu swimmers were making an effort to give Duke an even break. Kruger flashed through the water in fast time and then Kelli was handed a lead. Freddy Wilhelm made a great race of it and gave Duke a chance to catch the other swimmers.

Great Spurt

Lane for Palama, Kelli for the Healanis and Duke for the Hui Nalus in the last lap. Kelli was leading, and was making great time, but Duke sniply spurted and tore through the water, while the crowd yelled for him to catch the flying Kelli. He did and if there had been watches on him Saturday evening a new record would have gone down for Hawaii's premier swimmer. And Clarence Lane was another swimmer who was making great time. He went after Kelli and just before the finish he crawled up to an even position and flashed home in second place. It was a real climax to a great race. Duke had gone back. Yes, yes. He went back after another record last evening.

The Hui Nalus have a great relay team and the same may be said for the other clubs. It took Duke to win. No other swimmer in Hawaii could have gained on Kelli and Lane in the great race Saturday evening. It would surprise no one at the meet to hear that one watch had clocked him in 29 4-5 seconds.

A Real Picture

There were many other features during the meet, and one of the prettiest sights of the evening was the work of little Edith Kenn in the backstroke. She seemed to glide through the water like a breeze and her strokes were measured like the tick of a watch. No prettier exhibition of backstroke movement has ever been seen in a local meet. Blanche Fernandez put more power into her stroke, and made a great race of it, but the machine like stroke of the Palama girl was the real feature.

In the furlong event Harold Kruger made a great race of it and landed first position from John Kelli in fast time. Hitchcock of the Outrigger club was third. A. V. Kae hu lowered the service record when he captured the 50 yard event from A. W. Pingry. Kae hu has all the earmarks of a great swimmer, and the former Palama star is expected to show something in future meets.

Once more Edith Kenn came into the limelight when she captured the honors in the race for girls under 15. The little 13-year-old miss won from Julia Kehia, who startled the crowd by making a great race of it. Little Julia is one of Miss Capps' latest finds, and promises to be right up with the leaders before many moons.

Chinese Wins

Ah Kin Yee, the champion Chinese swimmer of the world, captured the special 50-yard event, which was a race of all nations. Lukela Kaupiko, the Hawaiian entry, was second by less than a yard, and Hitchcock was third. Matsuguma, the Japanese swimmer was fourth.

Had Clarence Lane not gone crooked in the 50-yard race he might have made 55 for the distance. As it was he beat Kelli to the finish line in 55 4-5.

Edith Kenn Wins

Edith Kenn was a busy little miss on Saturday night, and in the 100-yard event made the fastest time she had ever accomplished when she beat her sister Thelma and Josephine Hopkins. The time was 1:19 1-5 which is good time for a miss of that age. Thelma has usually won over her younger sister for this distance, and as it was she was only a few feet behind at the finish.

Palama furnished the swimming stars for boys under 15, as the first three competitors to finish were from that club. Hartwell Doane, Walter Chung and Lee Chong are three other

and in justice to Harvey Chilton it must be said that he has had wonderful success in picking up young stars.

Harold Kruger captured the 100-yard backstroke from Clarence Lane, but the judges ruled that the Palama swimmer did not touch both hands at the end of the tank, and was thereby disqualified. The novelty race went to Kahaleanu of Palama.

A Mix-Up

The one event of the evening which marred the spirit of it was the altercation between Harvey Chilton and the officials of the meet. Stickney, Rawlins, Langer and others were mixed up in it, but if Chilton had a protest to make he should have made it in a much milder way.

Stickney had ruled that Lane did not touch the end of the tank with both hands in the 100 yard backstroke. This naturally made the Palama trainer riled, and he proceeded to air himself in general. It was an unfortunate occurrence all around.

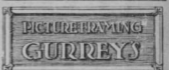
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
