The ladies of the Women's Auxiliary have agreed to sew the stars on the flag. agreed to sew the stars on the flag, but before this is done, the blue stars will be distributed to the mothers, sisters or wives of those who are at the front, or on their way there from the Outrigger Club. In letters of gold the name of each Outrigger member who is in the service of his country will be woven on the blue of the star that represents him, and these will be sewn on the flag that will be kept in position ever before the members of the Outrigger Club.

Perhaps no club anywhere has so many of its charter members enlisted in this war for humanity as has the Outrigger Club. J. P. Cooke Jr. will have his name woven on his star by his mother. He is now at the front in ans mother. He is now at the front in France, and, with his father, is one of the charter members of the Outrigger Club. The two Carter boys—Fred and Sam—charter members, are officers. Francis Cooper and his brothers, who are also charter members, are enlisted in the service, as is Marston Campbell Jr., another charter member now in the aviation gare bether ber, now in the aviation corp; both of the Gilman boys, Atherton and Arthur,

the Gilman boys, Atherton and Arthur, charter members, are officers in the army, and so one might go on naming Outrigger members in the service for a hundred or more.

The idea of the flag is that in years to come the Club will have this reminder of patriotism, and the sons and daughters of the men who went to the front, hence fifty years, may point with pride to these stars, as they tell their children how their grandfathers fought in the great war that brought about a world democracy.
