Last night in the games hall of the Y. M. C. A. the O. P. A. C. won from the Signal Corps, 15 to 2 and 15 to 5, in two quick fast sets. The second game of the evening was between the Palamas and the Koreans and the Palamas took the younger team into camp in two straight sets, 15 to 6 and 15 to 12.

The O. P. club played faultlessly and their team work was of the very best, while the soldier lads were way off in team work but played a good individual game. Individual playing does not win games, however, and, therefore, they lost. In the first set Lee, Pauhana and Higgins played the best game while in the second set Roberts, Gregory and Leslie starred. For the Signal Corps Shepherd and Nolan led their teams in both sets with Ross and Stakeup doing some fine defense work. Ross and Holcomb finished the second set strong and for a time their team held the O. P. boys even, but the team-work of their opponents was too much for them and they lost.

Palama-Korean Tilt Best

The Palama-Korean game was the best of the evening. The Palamas took the first set in rather easy fashion, owing to the fact that the Koreans had a lot of trouble in hitting their stride and also fell down badly in passing the ball properly, while the Palamas by a constant change of pace and hard cross drives and cuts seemed to have the Koreans at their mercy.

The second set was a different proposition and the Koreans, although losing, gave the Palamas the hardest set and the longest one of any yet played. At the end of the twelfth inning the score stood eight to four in favor of the Palamas and then the Koreans braced up. In the eighteenth inning they had tied the score, nine all. At the end of the twentieth the Koreans were leading eleven to nine. In the twenty-second the score was again tied, eleven all. In the twenty-fourth it stood thirteen to eleven in favor of Palama and once again the Koreans braced and tied the score, thirteen all in the twenty-sixth. With perfect serves and gilt-edge playing the ball was won and lost four times by each side before the next point was scored by Palama and then after some more hard sensational playing they scored the winning point, taking the game.

L. Brash Has High Score

The high scores of the evening were made by the following players: L. Brash leading with nine points out of fourteen serves and no misses; Pauhana, second, seven points out of nine serves and no misses; Roberts, third, seven points out of ten serves and no misses; Leslie, fourth, seven points out of eleven serves and no misses, and Arthur Parker, fifth, with six points out of ten serves, with one miss. There were two Palamas and two Koreans who scored five each and one O. P. player who scored five points.

Monday night Kakaako Mission and the Outrigger Canoe Club play the first game at seven-thirty and the O. P. A. C. and the Headquarters Second Infantry meet in the second tilt of the evening.
