

ATHLETIC CLUBS WILL GATHER TO DISCUSS PLANS

Board of Governors of A. A. U.
Will Meet at Pan-Pacific
Club Wednesday at 4:30

The board of governors of the A. A. U. will meet Wednesday afternoon at 4:30 in the rooms of the Pan-Pacific Club to discuss with the committee in charge of the luncheon at Lanikaea Friday, just what form that session shall take in launching the propaganda for a Pan-Pacific Olympiad in Hawaii after the war.

At the meeting at the Pan-Pacific rooms yesterday nearly every athletic club in Hawaii was represented and tables at the athletic luncheon Friday were engaged; for the Honolulu Athletic Club, W. T. Rawlins was the first to apply; J. A. Balch asked for a table from the Trail and Mountain Club; H. N. Mosher for the Army & Navy Y. M. C. A.; Glenn E. Jackson spoke for the Pacific League, with two men of each Pacific race at his table; a representative secured a table at the luncheon for the Waikiki Athletic Club; J. Brooks Brown asked for a table for Palama; while friends of the Outrigger Club, the Hui Nalu, the Myrtle Boat Club and the Healanis, spoke for table reservations for their organizations.

The most unique application for a table at the Pan-Pacific luncheon was from Louis Christian Mullgardt, who, with P. L. Weaver, asks members of the Olympic Club of San Francisco now resident in Honolulu, to join them in filling a table at the luncheon Friday—that a stronger feeling of friendship and cooperation be brought about between the two great athletic cities of the Pacific.

While the proposed Pan-Pacific Olympiad will be the topic for the luncheon Friday, Duke Kahanamoku, who will preside, has been asked to make another important athletic announcement that will interest everyone in Hawaii.
