

PLANS OUTLINED FOR SWIM TOUR AT CONFERENCE

A. A. U., Red Cross and Hawaii Promotion Committee to Work Together

At a meeting at the Pan-Pacific rooms yesterday afternoon representatives of the various clubs in Honolulu, the A. A. U., Red Cross and Hawaii Promotion Committee were present, and all agreed that a tour by local swimmers for a Red Cross benefit would be a good plan.

John Soper, chairman of registration of the A. A. U., said that he would write to F. W. Rubien or the other officials of the A. A. U. on the mainland asking for their indorsement of such tour. W. T. Rawlins, president of the Hawaiian Association of the A. A. U., is on Maui at present, and as a consequence was unable to attend the meeting.

Fred J. Halton, secretary of the Hawaii Promotion Committee, outlined the plans for the tour, covering every point. His statements met with the approval of all present. Representatives at the meeting were enthusiastic about such a plan and urged that Mr. Halton make the tour with the swimmers.

Castle Reads Letter

A. L. Castle was present and read a letter from the Red Cross headquarters at Washington in which that body said that they could not give a national indorsement to the tour, but appreciated the fact that such a plan would be a good one, and would be glad to receive any funds from such a movement. Each chapter will decide on the plan in each city.

Mr. Castle said that in case the tour went through as planned he would give letters of introduction to the Red Cross officials in the various cities.

With the indorsement of the A. A. U., Hawaii Promotion Committee and Red Cross, it is expected that the plans for the tour will go along until such time as a definite announcement is made as to the result of the campaign on the mainland. Seattle, Victoria and San Francisco have responded, and it is to be hoped that the other cities will see their way clear to stage meets. It is expected that some definite announcement will be made next week.

Aloha Messages

According to the plan as outlined, Mr. Halton would give talks in the various cities and also run moving pictures of Hawaii. It has been suggested that A. L. Castle for the Red Cross, W. T. Rawlins and John Soper for the A. A. U., and Walter Dillingham, president of the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce, write a few words of aloha, which would be run on the slides in the various cities.

Representatives of the various clubs agreed to fill tables at the Pan-Pacific lunch tomorrow at noon. At this luncheon Duke Kahanamoku will preside and talks will be given on various athletic subjects including the Mid-Pacific Olympiad, Pan-Pacific Olmpaid, Pacific League, Volcano relay, and track and aquatics.

Among the clubs which will be represented at the lunch tomorrow are Pan-Pacific, Honolulu Athletic, Myrtles, Waikiki Athletic, Pacific League, Y. M. C. A., Palama, Healanis, Trail and Mountain, Outrigger Club and Woman's Auxillary.
