

# D. P. KAHANAMOKU TO HEAD LUNCHEON

## Governor McCarthy Will Present Territorial Fair Athletic Meet Principal Trophy

Duke Kahanamoku, Hawaii's world champion swimmer, presides at the Pan-Pacific Union luncheon meeting today at Laniakea Theater, to announce the holding of a Pan-Pacific Olympiad of sports at the cross-roads of the Great Ocean after the war is over.

Governor C. J. McCarthy has promised to comply with the request of the Pan-Pacific Union trustees to act as honorary chairman of the Pan-Pacific Olympiad committee, and each athletic club in Hawaii has been invited to name a member of the governing board of the Olympiad.

There will be a table at the luncheon today for each of the athletic organizations of the city; the Honolulu Athletic Club, the Waikiki Athletic Club, the Hui Nalu, the Outrigger Canoe Club, Women's Auxiliary, the Myrtle Boat Club, the Healani Yacht & Boat Club, the Trail & Mountain Club, the Y. M. C. A., the Army and Navy Y. M. C. A., the Pacific Baseball League, Palama, and the Olympic Club of San Francisco (represented by its sons now resident in Honolulu, with Louis Christian Mullgardt presiding).

### Notables At Duke's Table

With Duke Kahanamoku at the speakers' table on the stage, will be seated representatives of the leading athletic organizations; Lorrin Andrews of the A. A. U.; Raymond C. Brown, secretary of the chamber of commerce; E. T. Chase, president of the Outrigger Club; J. A. Balch, of the Trail & Mountain Club; W. L. Rosa, president of the Myrtle Boat Club; Herman Lemke, president of the Healanis; Harold Castle, president of the Hui Nalu; Harold Godfrey, of the Honolulu Athletic Club; H. N. Mosher, of the Army and Navy Y. M. C. A.; O. T. Merrick of the Waikiki Athletic Club; F. J. Halton, secretary of the promotion committee; and Governor C. J. McCarthy.

The meeting today will be for the preliminary discussion, from the standpoint of those interested in athletics, of the possibilities of a Pan-Pacific Olympiad here at the ocean's "cross-roads."

The talks from the platform will be brief, that time may be left for open discussion from the tables. Every club, it is expected, will suggest how it can train its members to meet and compete against the picked men of Pacific lands sent to Hawaii.

It is expected that Duke Kahanamoku will soon visit the mainland with three other swimmers, to give exhibitions for the benefit of local Red Cross organizations. The announcement of these plans will probably be made at the luncheon today.

Duke will probably carry the first invitations to the mainland organizations to begin thinking about the first Pan-Pacific Olympiad—to be held in Hawaii after the war.

It is expected that Governor McCarthy, acting for the Pan-Pacific Union, will at the luncheon today present to the athletic chairman of the Territorial Fair, H. N. Mosher, the Pan-Pacific trophy to be competed for during the Territorial Fair track and field meet in June.
