

# CLUBS MEET WITH PAN-PACIFIC UNION

## Representatives Discuss Plans For Placing Objects of Or- ganization Before Public

Practically every club and association in Honolulu from the chamber of commerce to the Chinese Students' Alliance was represented by its delegates at the meeting of the Pan-Pacific Union yesterday afternoon at the club house on Hotel Street. The discussion at the meeting was along the lines of placing the objects of the Pan-Pacific Union directly before the public, that its entire endorsement and cooperation might be secured.

It was decided unanimously to accept the offer of the Ad Club to turn over its meeting on the roof garden of the Young Hotel next Wednesday to the Pan-Pacific Union, that its foremost speakers might place its objects before the clubs of Honolulu.

### Table for Each Club

At the meeting yesterday the Pan-Pacific Union was assured that every club in the city would send from eight to a dozen delegates to the meeting next Wednesday noon, when there will be a table for every club in the city, as well as for every race and nationality. More than a dozen tables, to seat ten each, were engaged outright, for members of the Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Filipino, Portuguese, and Hawaiian communities. The women's clubs were represented, and led by the Women's Auxiliary of the Outrigger Canoe Club, are engaging a table for twelve delegates. A number of others fell in line, and a table was also engaged for the Red Cross workers of the different nationalities.

A plan for all of the clubs in Honolulu to cooperate and help each other, possibly maintaining a central bureau, was discussed, and received the unanimous approval of the delegates present, and at another meeting this subject will come up for further discussion, as the Pan-Pacific Union has already offered rooms in the club house to house any such work.

### Project Discussed

The proposed Pan-Pacific Conference and the Olympiad were discussed together with the need of the backing and cooperation of every club and association in Hawaii to make a complete success of these after the delegates and contestants arrive in the Islands.

Perhaps the most interesting event at the gathering was the announcement by one of the clergymen present, that there would be a table at which "men in the cloth" of every race and denomination, would be present, and that this might lead to a monthly ministerial gathering of all denominations in the near future.

Pan-Pacific Day at the Ad Club next week will probably be one of the biggest events of either organization. The meeting will be open to the public but it is expected that those who wish to attend, and who are not members of the Ad Club, will phone their names to the Pan-Pacific Club—2989—and they will be assigned seats at the table they may select.
