

# DUKE KAHANAMOKU GUEST AT CHOWDER

## Outrigger and Pan-Pacific Clubs Hold Farewell For Big Fellow At Beach

More than a hundred friends of Duke Kahanamoku sat down at the Pan-Pacific-Outrigger chowder at Waikiki last night, and Duke and his old manager, W. T. Rawlins, sat together and said good things of each other, for Rawlins in his speech paid high tribute to the world's champion swimmer, with whom he had toured the mainland when both were struggling for recognition of Hawaii, while Duke, in reminiscent mood, told stories to his friends about the good old days when he and Rawlins had started the idea of sending Hawaiian swimmers to the mainland.

"Dad" Center presided and there were speeches from Myrtle men and Healanani men and Hui Nalu men and men of the Outrigger, and they were all speeches of Hawaii and of Duke. Owen Merrick, as manager of the tour and Clair Tait coming in for some reflected glory. Merrick outlined the plans of the swimmers, who are to tour the States, visiting thirty cities where swimming meets are to be held, the total gate receipts above bare expenses being in every city donated to the local Red Cross work.

After the chowder Fred J. Halton exhibited some remarkable moving pictures of surf-riding, and more than a score of surfers, including Duke and

aero game.

Icheo Katsuki, a boy entrant who has made several models and knows something of the contests in Japan, will tell the beginners something in that line. Alatau Wilder, another old-timer in the aero model game, will tell of the clubs in New York.

C. A. Pease, who is in charge of the contest, will give the would-be flyers some pointers on the contest that was held in Portland, Oregon. Pease has had the experience of flying with Lincoln Beechy, the famous flyer who met his death in 1915 at San Francisco, and will probably tell something of the thrill of flying.

The meeting will be held in Cooke Hall at the "Y" at three o'clock tomorrow afternoon. All boys who are interested in the making of models are invited. The boys will take this opportunity to form the Model Aero Club of Hawaii for those who are interested in the art of flying.

"Dad" Center, saw themselves as others see them daily from Waikiki beach, and every false move they made was commented on in roars above the sound of the sea, just without the lanai, and when "Dad" and Duke and another came in together on one board before a monster wave, the cheers of the hundred surf-riders present shook the rafters.

If possible, a private exhibition of this surfing film will be held today for Fanny Durack, for the Australian swimmer will be the guest of W. T. Rawlins, who will provide two machines for his guests of the day and a lunch at the Moana. Miss Durack will be shown the city and the day will end with a farewell at the steamer to the world's champion woman swimmer, and to Duke Kahanamoku, a truly Pan-Pacific combination.
