Best Women Swimmers Favor Agitation To Prohibit Daring **Costumes Now Becoming Com**mon At Waikiki

"It is not the intention or the desire of the Women's Auxiliary of the Outrigger Club to force women swimmers to wear pleated skirts in the water, or to attempt to go beyond the region of good commonsense in asking for bath-ing suit reforms at Waikiki," said a member of the Auxiliary committee yesterday.

"Our stand is well understood by the greater number of the best women swimmers in the city, and they are with us in our agitation. All we are trying to do is to prohibit such costumes as are becoming too common and which appear to very many as being over the line of decency.

Don't Be Absurd

"It is absurd to say that we would do anything to make swimming less easy for girls and women, because we are girls and women ourselves and are representing a club of six hundred women organized in order the better to enjoy the bathing at Whikiki. We have, besides the unanimous support of these six hundred women, the unanimous support of the board of governors of the Outrigger Club, representing six or seven hundred men swimmers, who certainly do not want to make swimming for women less pleasurable. "These hip-high, bosom-low, s

skintight costumes affected by some women at the beach do not make better swimmers of them. A few years ago, when no girl appeared on the beach without a skirt, there were more women surf-ers than there are today. Skirts never bothered them, such skirts as we propose to see reintroduced."

Models on Display

The agitation for the suppression of the more daring costumes now worn by women bathers is now attaining full headway and its effect is already apparent in some quarters. The drygood stores report a demand for skirted bathing suits and a decided slackening in the call for Annette Kellermans and their abbreviated little sisters. In the windows of Sachs, Ehlers. Fernandes & Correa and Jordan's there are soon to be exhibitions of various styles of bathing suits on models, which will give the general public the opportunity of comparing the costumes the women object to with those classed as desirable swimming suits.

The various swimming Anstructors of the Outrigger, Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. are on record as favoring the elimination of the "Show Me" styles. at the same time making it plain that the substitute costumes must still be
