The spectators on their feet, cheered Hattle on but Hattie had exerted himself. He fell to the ground utterly exhausted.

No doubt this race was the feature of the day and Hattie was the fea-ture of the race.

But the day will be better remembered by the territorial record established by J. Kawasha, who threw the 16-pound shot 40 feet 81/2 inches. The previous record was 40 fet 4 inches. Kawasha with proper training should soon be able to put the shot as far as the best of them.
