

'BUZZ' SMITH FIRST IN THREE RACES

Outrigger Athlete Upholds Honolulu's Honor In Hilo Track and Field Meet

"Buzz" Smith, the Outrigger Canoe Club athlete, upheld the reputation of Honolulu in the big track and field meet held in Hilo on the Fourth, taking first place in the hundred, two-hundred and four-hundred. In this meet Carolina's shot put record was smashed by J. Kawasha, who heaved the shot forty feet eight and a half inches.

The following is taken from the Hilo Tribune of July 6:

"Without a slip-up in the schedule of field and track events the athletic meet held on the Mooheau Park stadium proved to be as an interesting affair as was hoped.

"Each race and field event held the attention of the thousands of people gathered to witness the tests of strength and endurance of the human. From the 50-yard dash to the mile run, and from the jiu jitsu matches to the shot-put, the cheers of approval of the enthusiastic audience encouraged the contestants.

Hattie's Game Race

"It was the shout of encouragement that hurried young Hattie to within ten feet of the tape in the four-mile relay after his team mates in the previous laps had lost the lead given them by Helbush who ran the first lap. Hattie was fully 100 yards behind his man when he started. Machado's lead was apparently too much but on the next to the last lap Hattie was seen to sprint. The spectators were cheering for Hattie—he was fighting a big handicap. Good sportsmen usually cheer for the man fighting against unusual odds. Hattie sprinted the entire length of the lap and Machado, who had been setting his own pace increased his speed, regaining a part of his lost lead. Hattie soon followed and for the last 100 yards the two men sprinted down the track to the tape. Hattie was going to pass him. He had passed him—just a foot though and only a dozen feet to the tape. The spectators on their feet, cheered Hattie on but Hattie had exerted himself. He fell to the ground utterly exhausted.

"No doubt this race was the feature of the day and Hattie was the feature of the race.

"But the day will be better remembered by the territorial record established by J. Kawasha, who threw the 16-pound shot 40 feet 8½ inches. The previous record was 40 feet 4 inches. Kawasha with proper training should soon be able to put the shot as far as the best of them.

"H. H. Smith, a member of the Honolulu Outrigger Club and a post-entry took first place in the 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash and the 440-yard run.

"The Japanese sports, fencing and jiu jitsu matches were eagerly contested and well staged.
