

WOMEN MAY WEAR SUITS THEY LIKE, SAY CLUB MALES

At a meeting of the Outrigger Canoe Club last night the men passed the resolution that "Be it resolved by the Outrigger Canoe Club, that this club is not interested in the bathing suit controversy and that it is not officially connected with the Woman's Auxiliary."

There was a heated discussion before coming to this decision, some of the members objecting to what they called insults to their friends who appeared on the beach in décollete bathing suits.

Oswald Mayall, who first put the motion before the club, had couched it in much more pointed language, but was later persuaded to modify it by Messrs. Buttolph, Campbell, Wall and Lorrin Andrews. This was mainly brought about by the desire to avoid any ill feeling between the two clubs. What the Outrigger Club wanted to make clear, however, was that it is not interested in the bathing suits the women choose to wear at the beach so long as they suit the wearer. The board of directors was criticised for appointing the Women's Auxiliary chaperone as the chaperone of the Outrigger Canoe Club and for permitting the chaperone to impose on women guests of the men's organization rules and regulations regarding what styles of bathing suits they should wear.

Following the discussion there was an election of officers, resulting as follows:

Warren Dease, president; H. A. Walker, vice-president; W. J. Dickson, secretary; John Lennox, treasurer; Dad Center, captain of the athletic teams; Henry A. Asch, chairman of the entertainment committee; S. Starrett, chairman of the house committee, and J. M. Westgate and Fred Bailey, new directors.

The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$700.
