Regatta Day Not To Go Into Discard In Honolulu—Waikiki Beach Organization Prepares Neat Program of Canoe and Surf-board Races Which Whole City May Witness

Following the story published in The Advertiser yesterday morning, saying that something had to be done by the sports of the city so that Regatta Day would not slide by this year unremembered and uncelebrated except for the staging of a couple of baseball games, Henry Asch, "Dad" Center and a number of other live and wide-awake members of the Outrigger Canoe Club instructed themselves and did not let the seaweeds grow under their soles.

The Outriggerites tomorrow morning will pull off a neat program without it being necessary to induce entries through the offer of medals, ribbons or cups. They will go into this thing with the feeling that the sports will do them good, will give them wholesome enjoyment one day set aside for the purpose, and will, in addition, give enjoyment to the public.

Outrigger To Do Honor

Observance of Regatta Day this year falls entirely to the Outrigger Canoe Club of Waikiki, as this bunch of war-time sports will pull off an entertaining race program in the water without it being necessary to canvas the city for funds and without offering medals and cups in order to induce its members to the competitors in the nine events on the program.

The first aquatic event will start at nine-thirty tomorrow morning in front of the pavilion of the Outrigger Canoe Club, on the beach at Waikiki. The entire program will be over by noon. The whole city is invited, admission is free and there is room for thousands along the fine beach, from where the races may be viewed in comfort from the shade of the buildings and trees and without danger of near sunstroke.

Only members of the club will be allowed in the races as entrants and competitors, which is natural and proper, of course. The public is not concerned so much with who will be entered as it is with the fact that Regatta Day will not go to the discard this year.

Events for Young and Otherwise

The events offer a chance for men, grownups of all ages, to show and prove their ability as athletes in the water, for there are a number of events for this class or species of the genus homo. Ladies will also be given a chance to distinguish themselves in the water and there will be events for girls and boys, special numbers having been arranged for boys under fourteen in one case and those under sixteen in another.

Canoe races are every bit as exciting as those rowed in shells, while surf board racing is a genuine discovery and developed in Hawaii and which has a perfection all its own. These styles of aquatic sports have a better setting at Waikiki than in Honolulu Harbor and are far more enjoyable when one stands on the sand and under the dark green and shady leaves of the tree.

Annual Regatta Day Dance

The Outrigger Canoe Club will not be through with Regatta Day until the last number on the racing program is pulled off and finished. At three o'clock in the afternoon, while the winds will be on the beach taking the water, there will be a volleyball game staged on the court of the boat club. The teams opposing each other will be the Signal Corps and Outrigger Canoe Club. They have met before and played thrilling matches and tomorrow's should be no exception to the excellence of their two organizations. Four o'clock is the start hereafter.

And the all-around sport will not close the observance of the day, either, until there is a dancing program at eight o'clock, with the same music as before on the pavilion on the latter side of the court at Waikiki, while the evening breeze from the sea will be the pleasant accompaniment of the dancing. "The boat clubs do not feel justified in asking the city to contribute toward a big celebration or program on Regatta Day this year," A. R. Kroell, president of the Hawaiian Rowing Association, said yesterday, after he had read The Advertiser story on the question of celebrating the day in some manner.

President's Kroell's Reason

"First of all, we feel that the funds which usually go toward defraying the expenses of the day should be applied to the purchase of Liberty Bonds—and hope that they will be so diverted by the generous subscribers of previous years.

"In the second place, we have been advised by the navy department that it would be inadvisable and impossible to admit the general public to the waterfront at this time, when such stringent regulations against that very thing are being enforced. With no spectators on hand, Regatta Day would fizzle into nothingness.

"On top of all this we find, on going over our lists, that it would be next to impossible for either of the rowing clubs to put a representative team into a shell. Practically every one of our first-string men is in the service of his country and has put aside his rowing form in favor of his 'rowing form, if you get the distinction.

Eleventh-Hour Notices Sent Out

"Hence, we have sent notices to the subscribers and the chamber of commerce, stating that we would not ask for any contributions this year, nor attempt any elaborate program on that day. A few of the old timers will probably pull off a race or two, just for the sentimental value of the day—but, so far as anything approaching the usual celebration is concerned, that is all you until after the war."

The following is a circular letter, dated September 18, which has been sent out by the Hawaiian Rowing Association above the signature of F. R. Casgrove, secretary. A copy of this circular was received by The Advertiser last night, through the mails:

Rowing Association Circular

"We regret to announce, that owing to the present war conditions, the usual boat races will not take place on Regatta Day, September 21, 1918.

"The majority of the young men from the different rowing clubs, who would now be in training for the boat races, are wearing the khaki of their own and are training for greater events that will be staged on the battlefields of Europe.

"If they are gone by you have been called upon for financial assistance and through the generosity of your good selves and other commercial organizations of Honolulu, Regatta Day has proved a most successful success.

"We desire to express our appreciation of the support and cooperation that you have given this association in the past and we feel assured that when our business of World War I is over, that you will again be called upon to make a success of Regatta Day. This is the time that you are being called upon to support the physical well-being of Hawaii's young men."
