

DUKE KAHANAMOKU IN SAN FRANCISCO

World Famous Swimmer Expected To Return To Honolulu Sometime the Coming Week

Duke Kahanamoku is not lost. He was discovered in San Francisco a week ago yesterday and was then on his way home to Hawaii, according to advices received here yesterday from the Coast city.

But Kahanamoku was in no hurry to come home, although he is on the cards to be inducted into military service in Honolulu today. Instead, according to the San Francisco papers, Duke decided to remain yet awhile on the Coast. He had decided to remain over in San Francisco to witness some big swim one of the Coast city papers was to pull off last week across the bay.

Duke may have changed his mind, however, and decided to take the first available boat for Honolulu. If he did so he should arrive here this morning in the Lurline.

Of Duke's arrival in San Francisco one of the papers of October 22 says:

Duke in San Francisco

"Duke Kahanamoku, the great Hawaiian swimmer, arrived in San Francisco late last night on the last lap of his transcontinental tour in the interest of the Red Cross. The duke was stricken with Spanish influenza in Washington, D. C., and immediately after his recovery from the attack medical advisers insisted that he return to the Islands. He expects to leave for Honolulu next week.

"The duke reported his trip in company with Stubby Krueger, Clarence Lane and Owen Merrick a wonderful success. We cleaned up for the Red Cross and made a host of friends for

swimming in the East. Lane and Krueger remained in New York, and expect to enter the Pelham Bay nava training station very shortly. They already have enlisted, and are awaiting call to active service," said the duke.

"The duke had intended leaving for Honolulu today, but, upon hearing of the Golden Gate swim, decided to remain over and witness the event. He has viewed any number of swimming events in the United States, but has never witnessed so novel a swimming race before."
