

HAWAIIAN JUNIOR MARK FOR 100 SHATTERED BY WARREN KEALOHA

Monster Crowd Turns Out for First Night of Victory Swimming Carnival in Harbor



VANISHING in a spray of surf and reappearing well in the lead at the 50-yard mark, Warren Kealoha of the Hui Makani, hailed as a coming star in the swimming world, shattered the Hawaiian record in the 100-yard event for novices last night. He clipped over five seconds from the old time and made the distance in :57 1-5. That, coupled with the fact that Duke P. Kahanamoku came within four-fifths of a second of his world's record in the 50-yard dash furnished the chief features of the first night of the Victory swimming carnival in the naval slips between Piers 5 and 6. The crowd lined both piers, filling the bleachers completely. The races were run off in quick order, the whole program of 15 events not requiring more than two hours and 35 minutes, a wonderfully short time as swimming meets go.

Big Success

The evening was a grand success from start to finish. But one event failed to be staged and that was the service relay which went to De Russy by default. Every other event was closely contested and though Duke Kahanamoku won the half century he was followed closely by both John Kelli of the Healanis and Lorrin Thurston of the Outrigger club. The Outrigger club carried off many of the girls' events.

The crowd was large last night but even a larger crowd is expected tonight when Duke Kahanamoku swims the century and several other important events are carded. In all probability Warren Kealoha will swim against Duke in this event.

Lady Surprises

The big surprise last night was the excellent come-back on the part of Ludy Langer, who won the 400 yards easily. Although he did not lower his former record, he demonstrated that he is still able to lead the field in this, his own particular line. He is a likely man in the 220 yards tonight.

There was some talk about the work of R. A. Vitousek as starter because he refused to let the swimmers beat the gun. Vitousek used the regulation start of "Ready, set, bang," and it appears that some of the local swimmers have been trained to the old style of "On your marks! Get set! Go." It is a fact, however, that Vitousek did better than any starter who ever performed in these waters. And if his work tonight is as good as his work last night he will deserve a medal.

In the springboard diving practically all the boys did good work. The crowd wondered why no ladies entered. Dudoit kept the vast throng interested with their stunts.

Girls' Races

In the midget girls' race Ethel Mooney won out after getting away last. Blanche Fernandez won a good race in the 50 yards but it was no walkover. "Babe" Dowsett did not do so well last night as the fans expected. Kaehu made a great race in the 220 yard service event, winning for the navy.

Beatrice Dowsett showed well in the hundred for novices and though she got away to a bad start she almost beat out Agnes Auld. From the 50-yard mark to the finish it was even money. The Boy Scout relay was staged across "the course and was a scream. It demonstrated the fact that there are coming swimmers amongst the youngsters.

Though he was stopped in the stretch, Kaehu came in third in the 50-yard service event which Charles Lambert of the Signal Corps carried off. Granrose of Fort Kamehameha was second.

Credit for the success of the opening night in a large measure goes to the officials who made things hum all evening and the members of the executive committee.
