

# TWO NEW AQUATIC RECORDS MADE IN VICTORY CARNIVAL

## Future of Swimming Game in Hawaii Assured By Support Given Meet Just Closed

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### Granrose Lands Century

Granrose of Fort Kamehameha captured the 100 yards Service event, time, 1:01 2-5. Charlie Lambert Jr., of the Signal Corps was second, and Hensley of Fort De Russy third. Guyot finished fourth, unplaced, and A. V. Raplee fifth, likewise unplaced.

The Woman's Auxiliary was again to the fore, for Ruth L. Seybolt won the 50 yards girls' novice event, time, 35 3-5, also establishing a new Hawaiian record. Martha Lane of the Hui Makani was a fair second and B. Silva of Palama third. Miss Seybolt won a pretty race and was greatly applauded when the announcement was made by W. A. Anderson.

Robert K. Fuller took first honors in the high diving, while Jack Hjorth was second. Charles Dudoit was scratched. The various stunts from the high platform were interesting, both performers being applauded repeatedly as they went through the different air evolutions.

Keaweamahi, "Tough Bill," of the Hui Nalu, took the 100 yards men's breast stroke event, although he was pushed to win. Time, 1:20 4-5, this also establishing a new Hawaiian record. Kane of the Healani was second, and Fun Kealoha of the Hui Makani third. It was a pretty and close race between the three men.

### Service Good At Springboard

It was evidenced last night that the Army and navy boys have been quietly breaking into the springboard game and are doing remarkably well in the springboard diving events for service men. V. L. Sanders of Fort Kamehameha won first honors, Sylvester Granrose and Paul D. Mitchell, also of the same post, taking second and third places, respectively.

Edith Kenn, Hui Makani, was the winner in another race. This was in the 100 yards for women, open. Time 1:15 2-5. The world's record is 1:05 3-5, held by Fanny Durack. Dorothy Burns holds the Hawaiian record, 1:07 4-5. In this event Blanche Fernandes, Outrigger, was a good second, and Marion Dowsett of the same organization, a close third. The ten mermaids got off to a good start and bunched closely until near the end, when the place-makers drew away and finished in the order named.

The Hui Makani won the 600 yards men's club relay race, six men to the team, each swimming 100 yards. Time 6:05 2-5. The last lap was a pretty race between Warren Kealoha of the Hui Makani and Lorrin P. Thurston of the Outrigger. The two got away practically together and came down the stretch neck and neck all the way until near the finish, when Kealoha forged ahead and won by the matter of a yard. One timer caught Kealoha's time for the 100 at 55 flat.

### Relay Was Classic of Meet

This event was the real classic of the evening and whole meet and it brought the big audience, which remained to the very finish, to its feet. The Outrigger team won second place, and Healani third, the Hui Nalu being fourth.
