"Banty" Given and his Mills School baseball team, 1919 Interscholastic League champions, will leave for Hilo in the Mauna Kea next Saturday afternoon. "Boy Wonder" Nushida, the best Japanese pitcher ever developed in the Islands and the leading star of the Manoa team, is already in Hilo, which is his native habitat, spending the school vacation.
