

Pan-Pacific Olympiad Launched At Supper In Outrigger Grounds

Tentative plans for a Pan-Pacific Olympiad to be held in Honolulu in 1921 were made last night at a meeting of those interested in the Outrigger Canoe club grounds on the beach at Waikiki.

At the close of an interesting discussion, Lorrin Andrews, who acted as chairman, appointed a tentative committee of five to get in touch with organizations representing all lines of sporting activities in the Territory and to hold a meeting at which the feasibility or non-feasibility, from the point of finances, of such a tournament should be decided. Members of the committee are:

"Dad" Center, president of the Amateur Athletic Union, chairman, swimming and rowing; Mrs. L. Fullard Leo, secretary of the union, representing

girls' and women's athletics; A. L. Castle, of the Hawaiian Tennis Association; O. P. Soares, soccer and football; and Secretary Page of the athletic council of Schofield Barracks, representing the army and the navy.
