

HAWAII TEAM TO MEET THE OUTRIGGERS ON SATURDAY

Crawford's Varsity Outfit Plays
Surfboarders On Alexander
Field At Punahou

GAMES SCHEDULED WITH SCHOFIELD AND AIRMEN

Correspondents Have Much To
Say About Interscholastic
Officials and Downs

Hawaii's varsity team will play its first scheduled game of the season Saturday with the strong outfit of the Outrigger Canoe Club as its opponents. The contest will be staged at Alexander Field, Punahou, and as it will start at 2:30 p. m. those who attend it will be able to see a good share of the two interscholastic games which are to begin at 3:30.

Both teams have been practicing hard for the game and the college squad has shown more pep this week than at any time during the practice season. Yesterday the Kamehameha team was scrimmaged and, though honors were called even, the college coaches were more nearly satisfied with the team's work than ever.

The Outrigger squad is rounding into shape well and Coach Inman expects to give the college a hard run. The teams are very evenly matched as to weight but the collegians have had a longer practice session.

The officials for the game will be "Red" Zimmermann, referee; "Scotty" Schuman, umpire; R. A. Vitousek, head linesman. The field judge has not yet been chosen. The admission will be 30 cents.

The college will play the strong Schofield Barracks team on November 15, probably at Cooke Field, the college gridiron, and on November 29 will meet Luke Field, Coach Crawford announces.

A year ago Pearce was calling the signals for Coach By Diekerson's League Island Navy Yard team and made such a neat job of it that he was regarded as one of the snappiest quarterbacks in the service. Pearce stands a good chance of ousting Big Ben Derr, the South Dakota veteran, who was a star on the red and blue team in 1917. In all respect to the latter it must be said that he is slow rounding into form this season.
