

## Four Hawaiian Records Fall in Second Night of Swimming Meet; Youngsters Coming Up

Suffering from a splitting headache, ill and depressed but game through and through, Frances Cowells Schroth entered the 50-yard open last night, smashed a Hawaiian record, an American record and but for the "head finish" method of timing would have equalled the world's record of :29 flat held by Fanny Durack.

A thrilling, hair-raising finish in the girls' relay rounded out the second successful night of the fall swimming carnival.

Norman Ross, Illinois Athletic club, entered and won two events last night. He finished in the lead in the century sprint, beating Pua Kealoha by a yard or two. In the 440 yard he outdistanced his competitors by six yards or more.

Warren Kealoha, despite the fact that he did not win last night, demonstrated his championship caliber, defeating Harold "Stubby" Kruger of St. Mary's college by nosing out the backstroke wonder in the 440 yard race. Warren also finished third in the century ahead of Kruger.

Ross intended to go after the 440 yard record last night but when he learned that Pua Kealoha was picked as winner in the century he saved himself in the long grind and reserved enough stamina to trim the fast Hul Makani star in the 100 yards.

### Neat Race

The 440 was a neat race. Ross and Kruger were together on the first turn with Kealoha five yards behind. At the second turn Kealoha entered second place and Ross forged into the lead. At the 300 yard mark Ross had a lead of seven yards. On the last turn Ross had a good lead with Kealoha ahead of Kruger by at least three yards. Then Kealoha began a sprint that brought him up closer to Ross who maintained his old stroke. Kruger also sprinted and crossed the finish line a yard or so behind the Hul Makani swimmer. Both Ross and Kruger then swam over and shook Kealoha's hand.

The century saw a field of eight entered. For the first 50 yards all the

boys held to their lanes and then they started astray. Pua Kealoha was on the outside walkie lane and Warren on the outside ewa lane. Ross was in the center. The "Moose" saw Warren coming up but did not see Pua who finished second by a scant few feet. Warren was third and Ah Kim Yee and Kruger tied for fourth place.

### Exciting Relay

Probably the most exciting race of the evening was the girls' relay race which closed the session. Palama was not expected to win but it did by a hair. Elsie Auld and Gerd Hjorth opened the first hundred and the Palama girl finished with a good lead. Yoshino Mamiya increased the lead to six yards for Palama swimming against Beatrice Dowsett. Josephine Hopkins cut the lead given Rose Robero and finished ahead so that Mar-

ion "Babe" Dowsett left the plank on the home stretch with a few yards start. Agnes Auld caught up with her at the 50 mark and then the two swimmers went neck and neck to the last ten yards when the Palama girl forged ahead a fraction and won.

### Question

The 50 yards open in which Frances Cowells established two records and in which the "head finish" ruling lost her a world record, was a thrilling event. The timers timed by the head but had they timed by the arm as the A. A. U. rule books provide, the San Francisco girl would undoubtedly have equalled the :29 flat world record of Fanny Durack. But the officials say that it is impossible to time by the arm on the 50 yard mark of the present course where only a rope in the water marks the end of the
