HILO YOUTH WINS PRAISE OF "DAD" CENTER AS HE CAPTURES 50 YARD EVENT FOR BOYS 15

Big Island Swimmers Live up to Reputation and Battle Gately for Honors in Closing Events of First A. A. U. Meet—Fans Disappointed When Coast Girl Champion Is Unable to Get Into Action on Account of Straining of Leg Ligament.

HELEN MOSES FINISHES FIRST IN CONTEST LIMITED TO LOCAL GIRLS

Water Proves Trifle Choppy but Norman Ross Ploughs Over Both 100 and 440-Yard Courses in Fast Time, Taking Each Contest With Ease—Rain Falls to Mar Program—Ruth Scudder of Honolulu Shows Heels to Other Entrants in 50 Yard Dash for Girls Under 15.

"Hilo needn't be ashamed to have a young swimmer like that!" said Dad Center, the veteran aquatic expert, last night, when young Noah Kalama won the 50 yards for boys under 15 years in 28-4-5 seconds, which is only four seconds slower than the time established by Warren Kealoa. Announcer Major W. V. Allen made the remark public and the audience cheered the sentiment expressed by Honolulu's swimming authority. The remark might well be applied as well to Helen Moses, who came in a victor in the 50 yards for local girls in 33-4-5 seconds, winning easily from Christine Kelliop.

The Hilo swimmers lived up to the reputation they created on Tuesday evening by battling gamely last night in the closing events of Hilo's initial A. A. U. swimming meet. Honors were taken by the visitors in the most important events, but not in all, for in the race won by Noah Kalama there was a Honolulu representative, James Hakuole, Jr., who had to be contented with second place.

Little Miss Ruth Scudder, the 14-year-old mermaid from Honolulu, made her first appearance last night in a backstroke race for women. She had Gerd Hiorth and Edith Kenn against her, but she made it a runaway race and broke the record established by Frances Cowells in Honolulu last week. Then, the best that had been done in the Hawaiian Islands was 40 seconds; last night Ruth Scudder covered the course in 39 seconds.

FISH 24 OR 30 INCHES LONG VIES WITH CHAMPION SWIMMERS IN 100 YARD CONTEST OFF KUHIO WHARF

Unfortunately, Frances Cowells did not compete last night, for her appearance was looked forward to with great anticipation by the ardent fans, who had been hoping to see her in competition against Ruth Scudder again. Just prior to the 50 yards for women's open race, when lined up on the starting platform, Frances Cowells made a preliminary dive into the water, straining a ligament of her leg. She was compelled to retire and did not race in any event.

The brilliancy of the performances of the Honolulu girls and the speed shown by Helen Moses, Blanche Rose and Christine Kelliop in the race for the local girls, to a great measure detracted from the disappointment felt at the withdrawal of the Mainland champion from the two events in which she was entered.

Fish Wins Hundred Yards.

Norman Ross won the 440 yards men's open race in fine style, also the 100 yards men's open and was warmly applauded. The water was a trifle choppy, particularly in the early part of the evening, but there was practically no rain, a slight shower falling just as the last event on the program started.

During the evening the presence of a fish just under the surface of the water, swimming up and down the course, attracted quite a deal of comment. It appeared to be approximately 24 or 30 inches in length and remained in comparatively plain view for the better part of the evening. During the progress of the 100 yards open race for men it was in front of the swimmers for the entire distance, keeping well ahead. "It's a young shark," emphatically declared one spectator, who had remarked on its presence several times. "It realizes the necessity of improving its speed to nip the 100 yard night!" The remark may not have been so foolish at that, judging by the tenacity with which the finny competitor stuck to his work.

Fast Work in Boys' 50

Five swimmers lined up for the 50 yards open race for boys under 18 years, all being Honolulu lads, and a very close contest resulted between the Kealoa boys and Sam Kahanamoku. Warren won by inches only from Pua Kealoa, with Kahanamoku third and James O'Dowda and Albert Minnville, Jr., close up. The time was a surprise, being 24-2-5 seconds, which is two-fifths of a second faster than the time made last night in the 50 yards open race.

Norman Ross failed to establish a new record in the 440 yards race for men, open. He had to exert himself to win from "Stubby" Kruger, who made a splendid sprint when approaching the finish. There were only three starters, Ross, Kruger and Albert Makinney. The latter was first away, gaining almost one yard on the dive, but Kruger and Ross were abreast with Makinney a good length behind when the first 50 yards had been covered.

Ross had the advantage at the turn and at 150 yards led by one and a half lengths from Kruger, with Makinney two lengths farther in the rear, but staying with them. Kruger gained slightly in the next 50 yards, but was a trifle in the rear at the turn at 200 yards, losing about one length in the next 50 yards. The pair turned even at the 300 yards and a splendid struggle ensued down the last lap, Ross being just ahead as they turned for the final 40 yards.

RAISE NAVY PAY, DANIELS' APPEAL

Cabinet Officer Files Schedule of Proposed Advanced With Congress.

\$1,000 MORE TO ADMIRAL

Similar Increase for Officers and Men in Marine Corps Is Asked.

By The Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—More pay for officers and enlisted men in the U. S. Navy and Marine Corps, in order that the high standard of efficiency may be maintained.

This was the appeal of Secretary Joseph Daniels today when he presented members of the House Naval Committee with a schedule of temporary increases in pay which he wishes to give the officers of the Navy annually.

The increases outlined in the Secretary's statement include officers of all classes, from Admiral down to the chief petty officer and are scheduled as follows:

Admiral, Vice Admiral, Rear Admirals and Captains, an annual increase of \$1,000.

Commanders, an increase of \$900.

Lieutenant Commanders, an increase of \$840.

Senior Lieutenants, an increase of \$720.

Junior Lieutenants, an increase of \$600.

Ensign and Warrant Officers, an increase of \$480.

Chief Petty Officers, maximum increase of \$125.

Other enlisted men, an increase of \$40.

Secretary Daniels asked for the same relative increase for officers and men in the Marine Corps.

STOCK MARKET CRASHES

American Legion Would Bar Children of Orientals Born in U. S.

DEPORTATION OF SLACKERS

Hawaii Convention Delegate Introduces Resolution Acted Upon.

By The Associated Press. MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 12.—Former soldiers and sailors, who saw service with the American forces during the war with Germany today joined in the campaign under way in California and other Pacific Coast States against the Orientals.

By practically a unanimous vote the delegates attending the first national convention of the American Legion adopted a resolution demanding a Constitutional Amendment barring from citizenship all American born children of Orientals and others ineligible to citizenship.

The measure also demanded that every alien slacker and every enemy alien who was interned during the war be deported. The resolution further authorized the appointment of a Committee of members of the American Legion to spread the doctrine of Americanism throughout the country.

This resolution was introduced by Leonard Washington of the Territory of Hawaii, and was acted upon immediately after presentation.

Frank Dolter of Philadelphia was elected first national commander of the organization and Cleveland, Ohio, definitely decided upon as the meeting place for the next national convention.

BASEBALL WAR ENDED

Minor Leagues Resume Negotiations With Majors.
