

INDOOR SWIM MEET OPENS TONIGHT IN Y. M. C. A. TANK

Seat Sale Points To Full House;
Fast Time Made In
Tryouts

100-YARD MEN'S RACE
TO BE PRINCIPAL EVENT.

With Duke, Ross and Kealoha
Boys Entered, Records
Are In Peril

WITH two world champions, Duke P. Kahanamoku and Norman Ross, entered in the 100-yard event, the Y. M. C. A. indoor swimming meet, which opens tonight at the Central Y. M. C. A., promises to draw a crowd which will fill every available seat.

Judging from the time made in elimination heats at the "Y" last night, the races will be exceedingly fast for tank affairs. For instance, Ruth Scudder, the star of the Outrigger Canoe Club women's team, did 41 seconds in the 50-yard backstroke last night and Elsie Auld, winner of the other heat, was only a fraction of a second behind.

The big events of the evening will be the 100-yard backstroke for men and the men's 100-yard open. The second will bring together Duke and Ross, as well as Warren and Pua Kealoha. Duke will swim for the Outriggers, Ross for the Illinois Athletic Club, and the Kealohas unattached. As in the recent open water meet, the Hui Makani Club will not be allowed to compete as an organization, all of its swimmers being entered as unattached.

Although on past performances, Ross seems to have the edge on the Duke in tank swimming, the "Big Moose" is reported to have been suffering with a toothache for the last few days that has interfered considerably with his condition. On the other hand, Duke has done very little training recently, having practiced for only the last day or two in fresh water, and although he always is in good condition, he cannot be said to be at his best now. But under any condition, the race will be an interesting one, and since the announcement that Duke would swim, tickets for the meet have sold like hotcakes.

Trouble has arisen over the entry of Julia Kehia, the little Hawaiian swimmer, who had entered for the girls' events. Miss Kehia entered herself as "unattached" but the swimming committee decided that she must swim for Palama Settlement as she is signed up with that club for several months to come. The little swimmer, it is said, refuses to do so and will not appear in competition.

The races will begin promptly at 7:30 o'clock.
