

NORMAN ROSS BREAKS WORLD'S TANK RECORD FOR 200 YARDS—KAHANAMOKU SETS NEW MARK IN CENTURY EVENT

Enthusiastic Crowd Witnesses Many Records Go By the Board At Big Y. M. C. A. Swimming Meet—Warren Kealoha and Ruth Scudder Hang Up New Times In 100 Backstroke and 50-yard Breaststroke

NORMAN ROSS, the "Big Moose," broke the world's tank record for 200 yards last night in the big Y. M. C. A. swimming meet, making the double century in 2:06 2-5, the former record being 2:06 4-5. Ross did this in the 220-yard event, which he won in the fast time of 2:20 3-5, which was two-thirds of a second slower than the world's record.

Several Hawaiian tank records were smashed. The first night of the meet was a huge success. Bleachers, window and doorway were packed and every bit of available space about the "Y" tank was filled to capacity with enthusiastic fans. Great expectations are being held for tonight's program, the final events of the meet and a capacity crowd is again expected.

Duke P. Kahanamoku thrilled the crowd with his swimming in the 100-yard dash, when he won from Pua Kealoha in the fast time of 55 4-5. This breaks his own Hawaiian tank record of 56 1-5.

Pua Kealoha, the Hui Makani star, made a remarkably fast race and finished a close second to the champion. Duke continued on to the 100 meters and tried for the world's record at that distance. He negotiated the distance in 1:01 4-5. The world's record for the distance is 1:01. Considering the length of time that the champion has been out of training this is very fast time and when he gets in the best of condition again he should break this record. Duke will appear again this evening in the men's open relay, swimming under the colors of the Outrigger Club.

Ruth Scudder Stars Again

Ruth Scudder, the fast swimmer of the Outrigger Club again came to the front in the breaststroke and broke the Hawaiian record of 43 4-5. Her time was 43 1-5. Tonight she swims in the backstroke and is confident that she will break the world's record for that distance.

The meet opened with the 100-yard backstroke men's open event. Only three entrants faced the starter, Warren Kealoha, George Kane and J. Pua. All three got away together and the swimming was even for the first two laps. After the second lap Kealoha sprinted and drew away from the field. He won out easily. It seemed as if he did not exert his best efforts in this race for he swam a slow, beautiful stroke. However, the Hawaiian marvel broke the Hawaiian tank record for the distance held by "Stubby" Kruger of 1:13 2-5, making the distance in the record time of 1:11 3-5.

Special Events Good

Two special events gave humor to the evening. In the special 20-yard race for boys under seven, there were only two entries, both from the Palama Club, Ueno and Ed. Wise. Those two little chaps lined up like champions and took the water with the starter's gun. For 10 yards they held to their courses, swimming like champions. Suddenly Ueno, who had the lead, made a complete half turn, and touched the side of the tank. Thinking that he had finished the race, he looked up proudly and was surprised when told that he had not finished. He gamely continued on to the finish and received the plaudits of the crowd.

The diving contest was not held due to the fact that the spring board was broken by one of the divers in practice yesterday afternoon. However, Sanders, Fuller and Hjorth consented to give a short exhibition of high diving. Full gainers, twists and flips electrified the crowd.

They Dove in Concert

Several dives were given in concert by the three men. These were especially graceful and thrilling. To conclude the number each contestant exhibited his own special dive. Sanders' De Russy Special took the prize—for the splash it made. Sanders twisted about in the air and subsided in the water as "Fatty" Arbuckle would have done, with the result that the interested spectators opposite the diving stand received a generous ducking. Captain Bain, who up to this time was a very interested onlooker, received the full benefit of the dive. And he wore a Palm Beach suit, too.

The girls' relay was an exciting one, with the Palama Girls' Club winning out by a stroke from the Outrigger Club. The race was thrilling. The Outrigger Club took the lead and it looked as if the benchwarmers would win the race, but Elsie Auld, swimming last for the Palama Club, took up a beautiful spurt and won out from Josephine Hopkins by inches. This was by far the best race of the evening.

Tonight will end the swimming meet and another large crowd should turn out to witness the various events. With such champions as Duke Kahanamoku, Norman Ross, Warren Kealoha, and Ruth Scudder swimming, there is no doubt that a large delegation of swimming fans will be on hand at 8 o'clock when the first gun will be fired. Every swimmer is confident that he will break a record, which insures some mighty fast times.
