**The "Why" Of It All**  
These All-Star selections were made not before but after last Saturday's game between the Town Team and Schofield and, therefore, include the work of all teams and all players in all actual contests.

These selections were made in conference by R. W. Thacker, coach of Schofield, C. C. Williams, football official, who has worked in most of the big games, and H. W. Page, athletic director, Y. M. C. A. of Schofield.

First, the position of right end was considered and Huston of Schofield was given the place. Huston is a natural end and is out of place in any other position except that of defense. His chief value lies in returning punts, at which he is in a class by himself on the Islands today. Huston's speed is his greatest asset and when on the receiving end of a forward pass or making end runs it is especially noticeable. Some may place Huston at quarter on the mythical eleven, but this is not his

proper place and he was only used here by Coach Thacker to fill an emergency until a quarterback could be developed.

O'Sullivan of the Outrigger Club is given the right tackle job, although Swartly of Schofield pressed him very closely for first honors. The Outrigger man, because of his larger experience and the fine showing, was selected.

No guard in the Hawaiian Islands today is in a class with McAlexander of Schofield, who is chosen for the position of right guard. "Mac" is young, strong, heavy and fast. Few have been the plays aimed at him that have passed the scrimmage line and many times he has broken through and, with sure and deadly tackling, nailed the man with the ball or broke up the play before it ever got started.

For the center position Johnson of Schofield was given the choice. His work has been high class all season and while not spectacular has been mighty effective. He has been more than a match for any who have opposed him.

#### Duke's Brother Favored

Left guard goes to Kahanamoku of the Outrigger Club who, although he played tackle part of the time, is a real guard and balances McAlexander better than any other guard on the Islands.

Flemming of Luke Field was easily one of the best tackles seen here this year and although the Aviators were not as strong as other teams his work stood out in every game and resulted in his selection as left tackle.

To Canario of the Outrigger Club goes the honors of playing this platoon team. His work at quarter all season has been very high class and he has handled his team with rare good judgment in all its games.

Hollinger of the Outrigger Club, while he did not participate in all the games played by his team, owing to injuries, is entitled to right half. The brand of football displayed by him in the games in which he did participate certainly warrants his selection.

Selection for back field positions were very hard to make, as many good men were seen in action. Among them the following were the most prominent: Stickney, Outrigger; Bromley, College of Hawaii; Noel, Teetsel and Conway, Schofield, and Brown of the Outrigger Club.

Arzona of the Town Team gets the full back position and it is safe to say that he is the best man for the job. Although he did not show particularly well in the Schofield game, his playing as a whole this year has demonstrated that as a ground grimer and defensive player he is without a really close rival. In Brash, the College of Hawaii has its only first team man and Brash is no doubt the best half back in the game. He is cool, shifty, knows the tricks of the game, passes very well and is no mean punter. He is selected to hold down full half.

#### Rodriguez' Boet Helps Out

Left end must go to Rodrigues on his kicking alone, as there are several men as good as he in all other departments of the game. The two Thompsons deserve special mention and the margin between either one and Rodrigues for a place on the squad is so slight that a choice was very hard to make.

In the selection of any All-Star team, working a combination must be kept in mind and it is the firm belief of the writer that could the above men be brought together they would form an unbeatable team if scheduled to play against any of the present teams or any other combination of the present teams.

The climate of Hawaii is not particularly conducive to the best football, as the heat is so great even on cool days that most men not born here or at least not old residents of the country find it mighty hard to keep going at top speed through an entire game. However, even with this handicap all teams put up a brand of football worthy of much better support than the fans of Honolulu



## U. S. Amateur Boxers Win Bouts Abroad

The three American amateur boxers now on tour in the Scandinavian countries fared well in the recent tourney held in Stockholm, Sweden, according to a cablegram received at the A. A. U. national headquarters recently. The despatch was signed by Emil Anderson, secretary of the Sparta Club, Copenhagen.

The American team is composed of Ashton Donze, New Orleans; James Burke, Pittsburgh, and Frank Cassidy of this city. According to Anderson, Cassidy won his two preliminary bouts in his class, but was beaten in the final. However, both Donze and Burke were more successful, winning their preliminary and final bouts in their respective classes.

Cassidy is yet to register a victory against his Scandinavian boxers. His failure thus far is attributed to his inability to get acclimated. The American boys made their first appearance abroad at Copenhagen last week, with Donze the only one of the three boxers to score a victory.
